THE BORDEN CABINET AND ITS CRITICS.

Mr. Borden was perhaps a little hurried in his cabinet making. The task was new to him—he had never had that duty to perform before. The party is represented in the new Parliament by many new men, who make up from one-third to one-half of the Conservative total. To choose a cabinet under such circumstances and allot them among nine Provinces with due regard to all the interests concerned was a task of no small magnitude as well as a work requiring much judgment and tact. A month would have been little enough time, but the celerity with which Sir Wilfrid and his colleagues vacated their offices and the exigencies of a going and a coming Governor General would not admit of long delay. So the task that would properly have occupied four weeks was completed in a little more than two weeks.

It was not to be expected that in completing his rather hurried task Mr. Borden would wholly satisfy his friends or disarm the criticism of his opponents. There are, in fact, some expressions of discontent with the result in such unexpected quarters as the columns of the Montreal Star and the Toronto Telegram, both so-called independent Conservative journals. But on the whole the new Cabinet has been fairly well received by the press of Canada, of Great Britain and the United States. And it is to be observed that the Government as now formed is likely to be considerably changed in its personnel before the second Parliament of the term is called to assemble. There will, we think, be found throughout Canada a disposition to give the new Administration a fair trial on its policy and merits as they develop, without scanning too critically the names and records of its members or the allotment of the various portfolios.

It does appear, however, that two members to represent the three Maritime Provinces is a rather slender share of cabinet positions for the eastern section of the Dominion while Ontario and Quebec have a lion's portion allotted to them. Of course, Ontario had to be considered because of contributing considerably more than the whole of Mr. Borden's big majority. But the Premiership is held, in the east and that of itself should be a sufficient guarantee that Maritime interests will not be neglected.

As to the general array of men

whom Mr. Borden has got together in his Cabinet it may be said their weakest point is perhaps the lack of administrative experience. Mr. Borden and most of his colleagues have had no experience in managing departments and state affairs. Mr. Foster, Mr. Cochrane, Mr. Rogers and Mr. Hazen are the exceptions in that regard and their experience will be of value, while the others will doubtless speedily acquaint themselves with the work they will have to do in directing the various departments under their care.

Present appearances would indicate that so far as Prince Edward Island is concerned we shall have to look to Mr. Hazen in the future, along with Mr. Borden himself as our special representatives in the Cabinet. Both of them are able and upright public men who have in the past interested themselves seriously in our wants and requirements. Mr. Hazen, as Minister of Marine will have the control and direction of the winter steamer service and we sincerely hope and trust that in his hands the interests of this Province are quite safe, and will be quite as well guarded as under any of his predecessors for a decade past. Premier Borden himself has given his pledge to find out what can be done and to do the best that can be done to place our communications with the mainland on the best possible footing that can be attained at reasonable cost. If he does this he will deserve well of the Province and will earn the gratitude of Prince Edward Island.

The Toronto Globe says of Premier Borden "that he comes to his high task with an unblemished personal record." That is much to say. And it may be added that he has among his supporters in and out of Parliament a great aggregation of the men of achievement, the men who have done things and kept great industries in operation in Canada, the men of wealth who give employment to labor in the factories, the mines and in the great transportation interests of the country. It is safe to say that the best brains engaged in trade and industry in the Dominion are largely with Mr. Borden at the outset of his career as Premier. He should be able under such conditions to give the country a strong business Government. This he has attempted in the selections he has made of his colleagues and doubtless will continue to do as changes in the personnel of his Cabinet from time to time. Altogether Mr. Borden seems to have quite as good prospects of a long term of power as Sir Wilfrid Laurier had when he became Premier of Canada as an untried man fifteen years ago.

NEW GOVERNMENT FOR NEW BRUNSWICK.

The promotion of Hon. J. D. Hazen, Premier of New Brunswick, to be Minister of Marine in Mr. Borden's Cabinet at Ottawa, dissolved the Provincial Government and renders a reconstruction necessary. The Hazen Government was formed in March,

1908, and has remained without change down to the present time.

At a meeting held in St. John on Thursday evening last Hon. Mr. Hazen tendered his resignation to the Lieutenant Governor and recommended Hon. J. K. Flemming of Carleton County as the new Premier. He was sent for by the Governor and accepted the task of forming a new Administration, which will probably be announced today.

The new Premier of the sister Province is a man of fine presence, a good speaker, well-informed and popular. He is forty-three years of age and has held the portfolio of Provincial Secretary during the past four years. Although not formally announced as yet it is expected that a general election will be brought on at once, with good prospects of the new Administration being sustained at the polls. The result of the recent federal contest has no doubt somewhat depressed the hopes of the Liberal Opposition, but the latter, under the leadership of Hon. Clifford Robinson of Moncton, may put up a pretty stiff fight.

NOTES.

The Liberals are calling a convention of poll delegates to select a candidate for Councillor in the coming Local election for the Fourth Queen's, or Belfast District. At a former convention Kenneth J. Martin, city, was tendered the unanimous nomination, but resigned later to accept the appointment as Stipendiary Magistrate for Charlottetown, which, by the way, was the last official appointment of the Laurier Administration. The coming convention will be held in Eldon Hall on Thursday next.
