Interesting Liquor Case

A conviction was made in the City Police Court on Saturday last which has caused a little more than ordinary interest in certain circles.

A resident of the city, not being quite satisfied with the facilities for obtaining liquor under the provisions of the Prohibition Act, sent an order to a wholesale house in Montreal to forward a case of liquor to him in Charlottetown. The liquor duly arrived in Charlottetown but before it reached the hands of its owner it was seized in the office of the Express Company by an Inspector under the Prohibition Act. Proceedings were then taken under the Act to have the liquor condemned, and notwithstanding the objections to this course urged by the consignee or owner, it was condemned and forfeited and ordered to be turned over to the Prohibition Commissioners to be destroyed or otherwise dealt with as they might think fit.

An information was next laid against the consignee or purchaser of the liquor, charging him with having caused the liquor to be brought into Prince Edward Island from another province, and with knowing or intending that the liquor would be thereafter dealt with in violation of the provisions of the Prohibition Act.

It may not be generally known that by the combined effect of the Prohibition Act of this province and of the Dominion Statute, commonly known as the "Dogherly Act," it is unlawful for any person to send, ship, bring, or import intoxicating liquor from any other Province in Canada into P. E. Island, unless the consignee be a vendor appointed under the Prohibition Act. The few exceptions to this restriction, such as sacramental wine shipped to a clergyman, or liquors shipped here for bona fide purposes of export, have no interest to the would-be importer of liquor whose aim in such importation is to sell the liquor or to have it on his own personal use.

Section 59 of the Prohibition Act makes it unlawful for any person in this province to keep or have liquor in his possession unless it be obtained or kept in the manner authorized and provided by the Act.

The Act known as the "Dogherly Act" which was declared to have been passed in aid of provincial legislation, makes it unlawful to send, or to bring, or to cause to be brought, intoxicating liquor into a province to be dealt with in violation of the law of the province, where the sender, carrier or importer knew or intended it was to be so dealt with; and by the same Act it is declared that the knowledge or intention of the accused person as to such violation of the provincial law shall be presumed unless he can show that the liquor was to be thereafter dealt with in a lawful manner. This being now an impossibility in Prince Edward Island, except in the few cases where liquor may be lawfully sold or kept under the Prohibition Act, it follows that all persons in this province who cause liquors to be shipped to them from another province for their own personal use, as well as those who import for purposes of sale, are guilty of an offence against the Dominion Statute, and subject to the penalties provided by that Act.

Since the repeal of the Dominion Orders in Council passed under the Dominion War Measures Act there have been in this province in some quarters that persons here may import liquors on their own account ad libitum, and the province has been flooded with circulars from liquor houses in other provinces offering to sell liquor at quotations and declaring that such liquors may now be purchased and imported without restriction.

The prosecution before the Court on Saturday last with its result, the conviction of the defendant, the first of its kind in this Province, should be noted by any persons here who may be tempted to accede to the suggestions of these circulars and think that by importing liquors on their own account they can evade the provisions of the Prohibition Act.

IMPORTANT TO CANADIAN FARMERS. CAMBRIDGE, Eng., March 12.—Canadian farmers may soon be able to have their seed wheat vaccinated against rust and other troublesome diseases before they plant it. Tests by botanists of Cambridge University are said to have shown the possibility of breeding disease-proof plants and immunizing wheat, oats, barley and potatoes. They have also produced a new wheat known as "Yeoman," which has yielded 98 bushels to the acre.

FRENCH AROUSED BY STATEMENT OF PRESIDENT WILSON

WASHINGTON, March 12.—State Department officials today would neither deny or confirm public reports that France had protested to the United States Government against President Wilson's statement in his recent letter to Senator Hitchcock, that "a militaristic party under the most powerful leadership" was now in control in France.

NAVAL BRONZE STAR

OTTAWA, March 11.—The department of the naval service announced that the issue of the 1914 bronze star for service in the Royal Canadian navy has commenced. The conditions for the award of this decoration are service at sea between August 4, 1914, and December 31, 1915. Applications are being received from ex-officers and men who consider that they are entitled to the star.

EXCHANGE QUESTION BEFORE COURTS

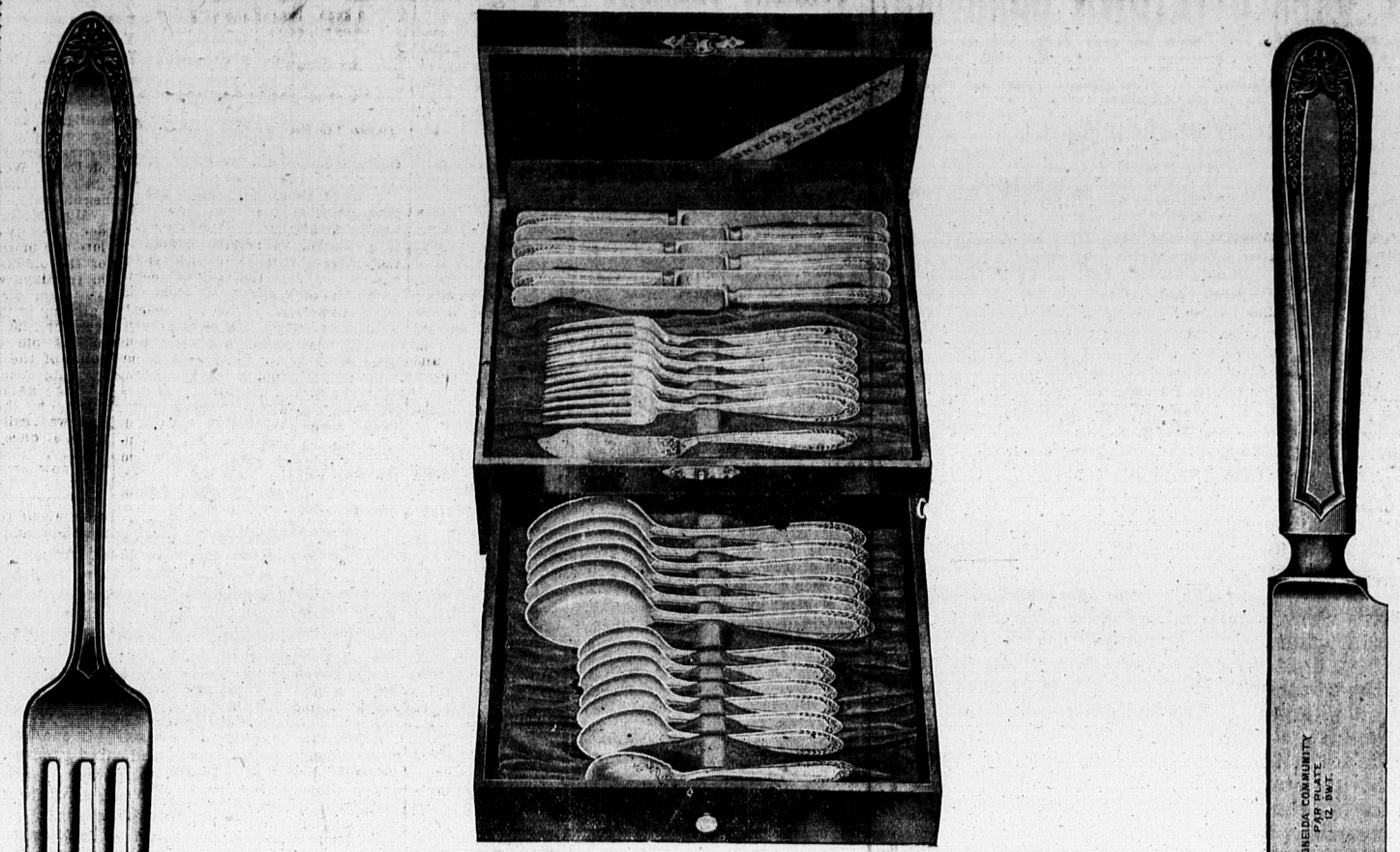
NEW YORK, March 13.—An interesting question involving Canada is the subject of a case which the Postal Telegraph Cable Company has instituted in the United States District Court here today through its Attorneys Charles E. Hughes and Wm. E. Cook, against the Canadian Pacific Railway.

The Postal Company in its complaint claims that it paid out in American money to American cable companies on behalf of the Canadian Pacific the sum of \$65,080 for cable messages to South America, Asia, etc., and that the Canadian Pacific Railway Company while admitting this disbursement, wishes to reimburse the Postal in Canadian money, thus placing on the Postal the loss in exchange of about 2 per cent.

The Postal claims that inasmuch as it paid out this money in cable messages for the Canadian Pacific in American money, it must be reimbursed in American and not Canadian money. The issue is a novel one in New York courts.
