Coaffe Near Record In Winnipeg Track Meet

WINNIPEG, Aug. 18.—Cyril H. Coaffe, of the Winnipeg North End Athletic club, again demonstrated his sprinting supremacy when he ran the 120 yard dash here last evening in 11.25 seconds, one fifth of a second slower than the world's record established by R. E. Walker, of Johannesburg, in 1908.

Coaffe equalled the world's 100 yard record in the Canadian championship at Calgary last Saturday by tying Charles Paddock's mark of 9.35 seconds.

Two weeks ago, in the Manitoba championships, Coaffe won the low hurdles in 25.25 seconds, and clipped two fifth seconds of the Canadian record, it became known yesterday. He was not given recognition at the time, as the Canadian mark was unknown locally.

Davis Cup

America's defense of the Davis Cup, the emblem of tennis supremacy, depends on William Tilden the two former champions, Wilhelms and Johnston, and Vincent Richards, a nineteen-year-old boy who has never before appeared in an international competition.

The appointment of Richards, although the third ranking player in the States, came as a surprise as he displaces the seasoned veteran, Watson Washburn of New York.

Richards is a pupil of Tilden, the present champion, and first gained prominence in winning the national doubles.
