Whole Fields Of Corn Destroyed

CLEVELAND, September 20.—The prosperity of the corn along Lake Erie is threatened, according to L. J. Taber, Ohio Director of Agriculture, upon the return today of thirty United States entomologists from Canada where they went to study the ravages of the European corn borer.

Taken by Canadian officials to fields where two years ago the borer was unknown, the party saw fields of sweet corn where one hundred per cent were killed, and flint corn where not an ear was fit to harvest. Mr. Taber said. Quarantines now are maintained in Massachusetts and Canada and should be continued, the entomologists believe, and new quarantines areas must be established as soon as scouting reveals infestation. Spread of the borer into Ohio, despite rigid quarantine in infested regions, "makes extermination impossible," it is said. "Future combat against the insect must aim simply to retard the march westward."

Who's To Blame For The Jazz?

NEW YORK, Sept. 21.—It is almost impossible to find out who is to blame for jazz dancing. Really this is the question which many consider by no means inconsequential. At first thought one might pin the responsibility on the dancing teachers, but, if you ask them, they will shrug their tuxedoed shoulders in rhythmic manner and plead not guilty. Its fault of the composers, they will tell you, passing the buck in double-quick time. The denial of the composers is sharp, their contradictory flat and the explanation of the way of jazz music natural—they give the public what it wants. Seemingly the public is divided in its opinion on this big question. Some say the younger generation is to blame. Jazz dancing and jazz music are, they report, their own words just exactly what one might expect when the youth of land gads about sporty automobiles, simulates contempt for Mrs. Grundy's ideas and shows a determination to do everything in a fast and snappy way.

Others maintain that jazz is a natural reaction to Victorian customs. A few of their neighbors, almost abandoning hope, resign themselves to the thought that something called the spirit of the age is really the reason for fitful dancing styles, expressing wonder the while as to just what this little old world is coming to. The manner in which the dancing instructors put the blame on the chaps who create tunes is exemplified by R. W. Vizay, president of the American Society of Dancing Teachers. "Dancing is wholly a matter of music," he said. "The reason a waltz is out of date is because there is no Strauss today to compose a real one and make people glide to it. When good music is composed, good dancing will result. As long as you will have jazz music you will have jazz dancing."

A very small proportion of complex dance properly these days, Mr. Vizay remarked. Take the ordinary ballroom, he said, and you will see 20 couples tottering, five shimmying, three doing the "Chicago" and ten dancing properly he continued, but when they leave and react to the jazz tunes of the cabaret and the roof garden? well, now, are you going to keep 'em from shaking a mean ankle?

American Government Experiencing Difficulties

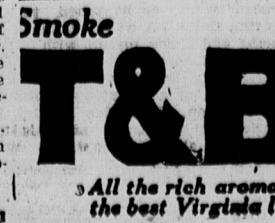
WASHINGTON, Sept. 21.—The American government is now experiencing inevitable difficulties embodied in long range discussions covering as important an international conference as that on armament limitation and the Far East. Measures were taken today to clear up certain misapprehensions regarding the American attitude in the approaching conference. It is stated by high authority that, first of all, it must be well understood that the United States, anxious as it is for the conference's success, cannot be expected to effect such success at any and all costs. This pronouncement is made clear, that America enters the conference with no thought that either the political future of the nation is hinged on the outcome. The Administration feels its stake in the conference is less than that of other participating powers. But perhaps the most interesting event of all was saved until the last, and the call to supper was greeted with a cheer which showed how keen were the appetites created by the sports. PLENTY OF MONEY

GLOUCESTER, Mass., Sept. 21.—The entry list for the American elimination race was increased to four today, when the names of the first four were entered by their respective owners. Vessels already in are the Josephine De Costa, of Boston, and Ralph Brown. The entry of the Elsie was tentative and on condition that she arrives from the Banks in time for the race on October 12. A meeting of the committee of fifty to raise funds was held at the Chamber of Commerce this evening. Everyone was brimful of enthusiasm for the coming trials to pick a defender for the International Trophy, and nearly \$1,000 was pledged among the workers. A committee was set a minimum goal of \$10,000 and a maximum of \$25,000 to care for the expense of not only this year's event, but also future races. The matter of having more seafaring men on the race committee was brought up and advocated by Capt. Geo. H. A very small body held a short session immediately afterward and added Captains John Matheson and Charles H. Hart to the committee.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 21.—The Administration, adopting another economy idea, has decided to stop the "junking" of light draught vessels of the United States Navy. Vessels obsolete for naval purposes but of possible value, will be transferred to other branches of the Government service. President Harding and Secretary of the Navy Denby are to have approved the plan during a survey to determine value and possible future uses of naval equipment. Coordination of the budget bureau conceived the idea that great Government waste occurs by virtually scrapping naval vessels of small type after they reach a certain stage of deterioration.

PARIS, Sept. 21.—General John J. Pershing arrived at Havre and proceeded here today. He was greeted by tremendous throngs. Pershing in United News interview, reiterated the denial that his visit to France was connected with the possible withdrawal of American troops of occupation on the Rhine, and declared his sole mission was to confer Congressional medal upon the unknown French soldier buried beneath the Arc De Triomphe, and unknown British Tommy in London. In his programme for the tour of France Pershing hopes to visit all American cemeteries and battle fields.
