Canadiens Win From New York Rangers 4-3

NEW YORK, Feb. 11 (AP)—The Montreal Canadiens scored most of their fireworks for the first 10 minutes tonight as they defeated the New York Rangers 4-3 before a season-record National Hockey League crowd of 16,981.

The Rangers, who had some consolation when they prevented Montreal's Maurice Richard from scoring the goal that would have given him a new "modern" scoring record of 44 tallies.

The victory was Canadiens' fifth in a row and their 16th since winning a defeat.

The crowd was the largest regular season hockey gathering in New York in about five years.

Committee Named To Hunt For Big Boss For Baseball

(By The Associated Press)
NEW YORK, Feb. 10—A four-man committee was named today to hunt out the man for the 1946-47 year job as baseball commissioner.

Will Harridge of the American League picked Aiva Bradley of Cleveland and Donald L. Barnes of St. Louis while Ford C. Frick selected Phil Wrigley of Chicago.

With neither a president nor a committee, some baseball men immediately predicted that Frick still was a strong prospect for a job set up last Saturday when a major league mogul adopted the position of commissioner.

Harridge has announced he is not interested in the position although the job will be given a seven-year contract at \$60,000 annually.

Wright and Bradley, in comments prior to last week's meeting, indicated they preferred a man not connected with baseball for the job. James A. Barry, one-time Grassy Point, N.Y., first baseman and former Postmaster General, and J. Edgar Hoover, head of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, loom as the top-ranking candidates in this category.

Barry was the one toward an outsider although he declared the whole thing was a matter of the "old boys' club."

EMPIRE ECONOMIC

tariffs should be established to maintain a constant supply of in-ter-empire economic problems.

3. Britain should free here as far as possible from agreements with foreign countries under which she is debared from raising duties on a wide range of commodities.

4. Quantitative control of imports by way of exchange control or quotas should be abolished as soon as possible although they would probably be necessary in the transition period.

5. Tariffs should be adjusted to provide protection for British agriculture, including duties on Empire farm products entering Britain, and cheap farm credits should be provided.

6. Britain should attempt to restore her overseas investments shattered by the war, through commercial investment in foreign countries and particularly Empire countries, a progressive merchant shipping program, and "a moderate but steady" flow of emigration to the Dominions.

"If the Empire will act as an economic unit, in dealing with the rest of the world, we shall be able to make those arrangements which will suit us best, and probably in one way or another the most beneficial to the rest of the world," writes Sir Herbert.

The most vital thing of all is not to overlook the problem of agriculture. In the long run the world can be prosperous only if the agricultural community is prosperous.
