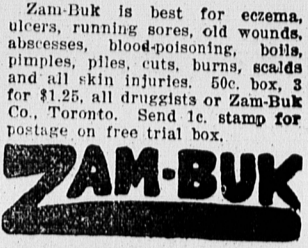

### DEFAULTERS ARE BEING ROUNDED UP

ST. JOHN, May 22.—The Dominion police brought to the city last evening a party of men who were apprehended on Sunday in Kent county for not complying with the military service act. If the party was one of the St. Pierre brothers, who caused no little excitement at Coeagne Bridge recently when the family opposed the police in the discharge of their duties. The mother on that occasion had in her hand a revolver which she threatened to use, and another son had a gun. This weapon was however not used.

The men were rounded up on Sunday and it is thought that the police have in the party several of the men who did the agitating. It is also reported that at least a hundred, all natives of the county have betaken themselves to the woods and intend to defy the officers. Kent county owing to smallpox was later in coming under the military service act, and it will likely require something to apprehend the defaulters. Chief Ritchie, it is stated, has given the men in hiding until Sunday next to report and failing to do so, he intends to take active measures to arrest them.

### AMERICANS PUT THE GERMANS TO FLIGHT

WITH THE AMERICAN ARMY IN FRANCE, May 21.—By the Associated Press—The Germans attempted a vigorous silent raid on one of the American combat groups within a strong point in the Luneville sector this morning, but were badly beaten. The raid was a complete failure and cost the enemy considerable losses. None of the Americans are missing. The fight was carried on with hand-grenades, rifles and revolvers, and it was virtually hand-to-hand. The Germans beat a hasty retreat after ten minutes, carrying virtually all their dead and wounded with them.
