TORONTO, Nov. 6 - For eight days, commencing Friday, Nov. 13, the Royal Winter Fair will hold its fourth annual show in the Coliseum. The management promises its great army of patrons many new features notable among which will be the international jumping contest. Cavalry teams representing France, Belgium, Canada and the United States will take part. Each section will assume an international aspect, including the light horse show, which compares with the New York and London Olympia Shows.

The comprehensive collection of the best that Canada produces in pure-bred stock in poultry and pet stock, in silver black foxes, in tropical and fancy fish, in fruit, seeds, vegetables, in dairying and in products allied with the agricultural industry, form an exhibition of first importance. The display of silver foxes promises to be the biggest ever staged on the continent.

Waiting Is King's Game

Answer came in these words: "Oh, I think not. The public is a fickle lot and will smash anything with Mackenzie King's picture on it. A year from now new issues may have arisen—anyway times may be better, things cannot possibly be worse for the Liberals than they are now."

And that being settled, those Grits turn their attention to patching up a riddled, decrepit and dilapidated cabinet. Of course, there is no lack of seats for the Premier. Officers of such are coming in by wire, mail and native runners. It is remembered that Archie McColg got a Senatorship for making way for Hon. Jim Murdoch, and if Jim is worth a Senatorship, what price a Premier?

As to the other, they'll probably have to wait. The Grit Government, even in times of stress, can wiggle along without Messrs. Vincent Massey and H. M. Marler. Possibly the country can do likewise. The disappearance of Hon. George Gordon will be welcomed by all and sundry. Hon. George P. Graham is the only one for whom defeat brings remarks of regret. Even from the Grit camp, and the general opinion is that Hon. George was about ready to quit anyway, and that he'll probably be on the side lines still a Senator as usual recalls him to a minor spout of usefulness.

Honor For W. Middlesex?

The Tories think that the Premier playing safety first as usual, will decide to run for West Middlesex. Well informed Grits think otherwise. They think that Elliott will be given a cabinet job—it doesn't take intellectual Grits to replace the men who have gone, you know, and Ontario must have some kind of representation in the Government, you know. If so, Mr. King will probably seek a seat in Prescott. That's a pretty Gritty spot. So Gritty that the Tories thought the only way to carry it was to split the Grit vote. With that end in view they held out all kinds of inducements to one Evan-oles at Queen's Park, to run as an independent Liberal. Evan-oles listened to the voice of the tempter, ran and was elected. Then he declared he would support the premier. He also, it is said, could be induced to make way for his beloved leader.

There is also talk of Euler of Waterloo, and Malcolm of Bruce, being made Ministers. But there are doubts here. Euler is that indefinite something known as a Liberal-Protectorist, and is canvass. His constituents might not relish his appearance as a member of a low tariff cabinet. And as for Malcolm—well, there is a general opinion that he was pretty lucky to get by in the general election. He might not do nearly so well if he was asked to trot another heat.

Potato Shipments By Refrigerator Cars

The following telegrams between Sir Henry Thornton and Mr. Nelson Rattenbury speak for themselves: Charlottetown, P. E. I. Nov. 2nd, 1925. Sir Henry W. Thornton, K. B. E., Montreal, C. N. R.

Because of the high prices and active demand for potatoes in the American markets, movement of potatoes in this province very active. The shipping season is short and much danger from frost. Please arrange for a full supply of refrigerator cars for this province. There is an immediate demand for at least 400 refrigerators here.

N. RATTENBURY, Montreal, Nov. 3rd, 1925

Your message received. For reasons stated therein, movement potatoes to American markets has created unexpected and heavy demand for refrigerator cars from all potato growing points on System, and we are today struggling with very heavy shortage. Appreciate very much situation on island and you can rest assured will do utmost to meet demand. Situation would be assisted if shippers will make use of lined Box Cars for shipments to nearby points while weather remains good.

Signed H. W. THORNTON. The demand for large quantities of potatoes in the American market arose so quickly that of course the C. N. R. wasn't in a position to carry all the commodities offering. Probably no railroad would be sufficiently equipped to meet immediately a situation of this kind. Nevertheless, whatever is possible is being done, and it will be seen from Mr. Rattenbury's telegram to Sir Henry Thornton, and Sir Henry's reply, that steps are now being taken to carry the potatoes, at least the greater bulk of them to the markets where the ruling price is so satisfactory.

Western And Grace Hospitals To Unite

TORONTO, Ont., Nov. 6.—An official announcement is expected to be made in a few days of the amalgamation of the Toronto Western Hospital and Grace Hospital. Frequent meetings of the two hospital boards have been held and the negotiations have reached the stage where solicitors for the two parties have been entrusted with the legal formalities.

The proposed amalgamation has for its object increased efficiency and a lowering of overhead costs. It goes through a new hospital building with an accommodation for six hundred beds will be erected at a cost of between a half and one million dollars.

British Ship Saves Crew From Burning

NEW YORK, November 6.—The crew of seventeen men of the freighter Algiers, which burned Sunday night off the Virginia coast, was rescued by the British steamer Cassary, the Maritime Exchange was informed today, by wireless from the British ship.

The rescued men are now aboard the Rassay, which is bound for Queenstown. No details of the rescue were given in the radio message which was the first definite word that had been received of the crew since their ship burned. Burning of the Algiers was reported by the Birmingham City, which went to the freighter's aid in answer to an S. O. S. on Sunday night. When the Birmingham City arrived the Algiers was enveloped in flames and no sign of life was seen aboard.

Towers Had Planned To Slay

(Continued from Page 1)

Clews was aboard or not. He instructed the third officer, McLellan, to go ashore and arrange for a supply of fresh water for the ship. The Crown Prosecutor suggested that almost immediately after McLellan had gone ashore the prisoner shot down Captain Clews. Subsequently it seemed that Towers had gone to Holliday's room on the ship. Holliday might be sufficiently recovered from his wound to give evidence tomorrow, the Crown lawyer said, but it was very doubtful whether Gilmour would be called at any stage of the court proceedings.

Started Shooting

Continuing his statement to the court the Crown Prosecutor said Towers went to Holliday's room at 3.30 in the morning. He got matches there and went to Gilmour's room which was on the same deck. He asked Gilmour about the ship listing. Gilmour replied that if Towers had been aboard the vessel, where he ought to have been he would know all about it.

Seemingly, Rogers continued, the feeling between the two men at that time was not of the best. Holliday a few moments after seeing Towers, heard a shot and heard Gilmour shouting "murder." Holliday went into Gilmour's room and saw Gilmour lying on his bunk bleeding from a wound at his mouth. Holliday asked Towers what he done. Towers said: "Stand back or you will be hit."

Holliday grabbed Towers, the prosecution stated, Towers had a pistol in his hand and two more shots were fired. Holliday was shot in the lungs. Second Engineer Kennedy went to the rescue. He knocked Towers down and disarmed him. Towers then was put in charge of Master-at-Arms Elliott, who asked Towers what was the matter. Towers replied: "I shot Gilmour."

Planned Wholesale Murder - After being cautioned the prosecution proceeded. Towers turned to Holliday and asked: "How's the old man on top?"

Elliott asked Towers what he meant and the prisoner replied: "I shot the captain."

This was the first that any of the crew had heard of the shooting of Captain Clews, the prosecution said. Members of the crew thereupon went to the Captain's cabin and saw Captain Clews lying on his bunk dead.

Towers later remarked to Elliott, according to the Crown Prosecutor: "There have been made up against me for twelve months. I intended to shoot the Captain, Gilmour, Allen, McLennan, the Purser and then myself, but my revolver failed me."

SOUTHAMPTON, Nov. 6.—Thomas Towers, former first officer of the Canadian Pacific steamship Melita was committed for trial at Hampshire assizes, Winchester on charge of murdering Captain A. H. Clews, commander of Melita and attempting to murder two of the ship's officers, David Gilmour and John Holliday. Towers reserved his defense.

Pictou Island To Have Nurse's Care

HALIFAX, N. S., Nov. 6.—The 43 families on Pictou Island, in the Northumberland Strait, who heretofore have spent several months of each year, winter-bound, and isolated from medical care, will this winter have the services of a skilled public health nurse, in the person of Miss M. B. McCallum, daughter of the island postmaster, and the only islander ever to become a graduate nurse. She trained at the Royal Victoria Hospital, Montreal, and has been appointed through the joint action of the Nova Scotia Red Cross Society and the Provincial Government.
