This concession does not extend to British troops or British units in the United Kingdom, Tobago, cigars, and cigarettes for British troops in France. Also other articles if posted by private individuals.

PREMIER SMUTS GETS VICTORY IN SENATE

Fresh Challenge From Amalgamated Opposition Is Repulsed In South Africa.

CAPE TOWN, Feb 1—(CP Cable)—General Jan Smuts' administration tonight repulsed a fresh challenge from the newly-amalgamated opposition as keen political warfare continued in the Union of South Africa.

Victory for the Government which last September carried the Dominion into the Empire's war came when the Senate approved by 21 votes to 13 a motion by G. F. Clark, Minister of Posts and Telegraphs, confirming the Government's war policy. It rejected by the same margin an amendment by A. P. J. Fourie, a cabinet minister in the last administration headed by General J. B. M. Hertzog, to the effect that peace with Germany should be restored.

The House of Assembly defeated a similar opposition peace proposal, approved by General Hertzog, last Saturday. Thus both Houses of Parliament now have ratified the Government's war policy over which General Smuts and General Hertzog split immediately on the outbreak of war. General Smuts, former Minister of Justice, replaced his old chief at the head of the Government and now General Hertzog's followers have amalgamated with Dr. D. D. Malan's Nationalists to form a new opposition which has declared for outright republicanism, outside the Empire.

Denounces Armchair Warriors

In the course of the Senate debate General Smuts denounced "armchair warriors" who say they will defend Southwest Africa (formerly a German colony) to the last drop of their blood" and asserted that Adolf Hitler had planned to seize Southwest Africa after taking Poland.

The House of Assembly had a brief respite from bitter debate over the Emergency Powers Bill. This bill, a Government measure, validates emergency regulations and the removal of disabilities to which members of Parliament and others have been subjected by reason of their service in defence of the Union.

The opposition which apparently has decided to oppose the Government at every instance took the unusual step of launching a debate on first reading. It received its first reading Wednesday but due to the unexpected debate second reading is not expected until Monday.

Bitterness of Feeling

The bitterness of political feeling is seen in terms hurled across the floor of the House of Assembly during the first reading debate. While defending the Emergency Powers Bill, General Smuts was almost drowned out by opposition cries of "Slim Jinnie" (nickname for Smuts) "Jingoes" and "Rooiners" (the latter meaning red necks, a term applied to Englishmen).

Meanwhile observers studying the effects of the amalgamation of followers of General Hertzog and Dr. Malan believed the latter got the better of the bargain. One of the major points at issue toward the end of discussions was electoral arrangements. General Hertzog's followers must be content with an undertaking that their services will be taken into consideration when party nominations are made for the next election.

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Daily War Survey

When dispassionate historians start analysing events of the second Great War a century or more hence they may speak about the "battle of oil."

The battle is raging without the exchange of shots or shells, the men who fight it wear civilian clothes but in their cunning and resourcefulness they yield nothing to the uniformed generals behind the lines in France and Germany.

Today the battle of oil rages most fiercely as Bulgaria where statesmen of the Little Entente nations, Rumania, Yugoslavia, Greece and Turkey meet in conference.

Struggling to hold her precarious neutrality in the face of German demands for oil from Rumania wells and British and French demands that the flow of oil to Germany be restricted, Rumania seeks the support of the other Little Entente states.

Outside the conference room the agents of the warring nations wait and plot. In their minds is the idea that they may not only help their nations to victory but save many lives by hastening the victory.
