CITY CORPS SCORE HIGH IN PASS LIST

District Cadet Inspections Completed For Present Year.

HALIFAX, Aug. 24.—The inspection of the Nelson Sea Cadets at their annual camp on McNab Island and completed cadet inspections for the year 1930-31, and grading of the various corps in Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island has been announced.

Establishing a record for Military District No. 6, these figures represent an increase of 11 per cent over last year, and 24 per cent in the past two years.

Of the 57 active cadet corps, the 45 passing highest at inspection are:

General

With cutting well under way, and preliminary threshing returns coming in, there is now general agreement that the crop over the Prairie Provinces as a whole will run around 50% or normal.

THE BRITISH SITUATION AT A GLANCE

The Labor Government resigned and Prime Minister MacDonald was asked by the King to form a new National Government, which will consist of a Cabinet of only 12 or 14 Ministers representing all three parties.

Province of Quebec

Cereal crops have ripened quickly and while somewhat short in the straw, are, on the whole, satisfactory. Early threshings of grain show good average yields.

Province of Ontario

In Western Ontario all root, fruit and other crops, except where damaged by pests, are very promising with plenty of moisture. Rain, however, is badly needed in many sections of Eastern Ontario where pastures are drying up, and late crops suffering.

Maritime Provinces

The harvesting of a heavy crop of hay has been completed. Grains are ripening fast and cutting has commenced in some districts. Potatoes promise a heavy crop and some of the early varieties are now being offered on the market; other roots continue satisfactory.

Province of British Columbia

Heavy shipments of semi-ripe tomatoes are being made. The yield of potatoes is 100% of average and a large proportion of the crop has been marketed.
