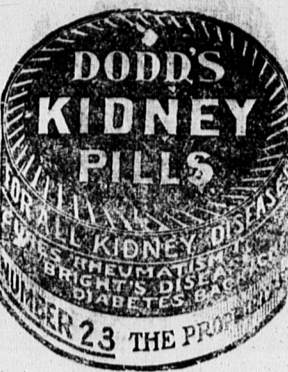
Hon. E. J. Hodgson, Master of the Rolls, is spending a few days in Summerside a guest at the Clifton House.

WHITNEY GOING TO ETAH AFTER COOK'S INSTRUMENTS.

NEW YORK, April 13—Another expedition to the Arctic, during which he expects to stop at Etah to recover the instruments of Dr. Frederick A. Cook, is being planned for this summer by Harry Whitney, of New Haven, the first white man encountered by Cook on his return from the north and who first heard Cook's assertion that he had reached the North Pole.

Paul Hainey, known as a horseman, polo player and yachtsman, will accompany Whitney. Negotiations, commenced today, are now being made to charter a suitable vessel and it is expected the expedition will leave St. John's, Nfld., in July.

Overtures are said to have been made to Captain Samuel Bartlett, master of the schooner Jaunie, sent to the Arctic last year to carry relief to Commander Peary, to command the vessel.

The principal object of the trip will be to obtain specimens of big game for museums and zoological parks and the recovery of Dr. Cook's instruments will be but incidental. Whitney is said to feel that since he left the instruments at Etah it is incumbent upon him to see that they are brought back and delivered to Cook's relatives.

AUSTRALIA SEES NEED FOR CHANGE.

LONDON, April 14—"We could, in my opinion, all sleep soundly in our beds in Australia when the two-Power standard was being maintained. Now the position has changed." So Sir George Reid, the first High Commissioner for Australia, began an important statement on Imperial defence from an Australian standpoint this week. The statement arose out of a discussion on the subject of the system of compulsory military service which Australia has just instituted. When the proposal for that radical reorganization of Australian military defence was first mooted Sir George Reid opposed it strongly. Within the last twelve months he has taken occasion to frankly admit that he was wrong in that attitude, and to give his whole-hearted support to the reform.

"While the two-Power standard was being kept up," Sir George Reid explains, "I felt that we were absolutely safe in Australia. I was strengthened in that feeling by the report of the Imperial Defence Committee, which advised us that the only at-

That was a small proposition, not calling for any great effort on our part to meet.

"But in the light of recent events I can see that I was wrong. I have watched closely recent developments in Europe, and have come to the conclusion that a critical situation is developing, and that the strain which the Mother Country is called upon to bear is becoming too great. I am not alone in that conclusion. There has been quite lately a revolution in the matter of defence in Australian public opinion. It is admitted on all sides that the present situation cannot be maintained, and that something must be done of a bold nature to meet the crisis threatening."

"Australia now is thoroughly sound on the defence issue. She is prepared to go to great lengths, is prepared to make large sacrifices, to ensure naval safety. It is difficult in this regard to over-estimate the value of Lord Kitchener's visit. That, I take it, has been an event of the highest national importance. Every word he uttered in Australia seemed an inspiration. He impressed us not only as the man who could win victories in the field, but who could organize for victories. His personality inspired us with the fullest confidence, and I am quite sure that the Federal Government and the Federal Parliament will follow to the letter every suggestion that he makes."

One of the first duties of the High Commissioner for Australia will be to raise a loan of \$17,500,000 for the first instalment on Australia's new navy. He will also be obliged to contest with the Canadian High Commissioner the claim of the Dominion to have the right of priority in applicants who seek new homes within the Empire overseas.

He will aim at peopling the vacant lands of the sub-continent with hundreds of thousands of energetic Britishers.

KNOX IS RECONCILED TO SON AND HIS BRIDE.

WASHINGTON, April 13—Philander C. Knox, Jr., and his bride, who was Miss May Buller, of Providence, R. I., have been received into the family of the Secretary of State, after an estrangement of some weeks. The pair came here from New York last night, where terms of reconciliation were agreed upon between young Phil and his brother, Reed Knox, who acted as intermediary.

The marriage of young Knox and Miss Buller was a runaway affair, and occurred while the young man was a student in a New England school. First attempts on the part of young Knox to reconcile his parents to the marriage were a failure, and the young man prepared to make his own way in the world, procuring a situation with an automobile firm.

The reconciliation was a triumph of diplomacy. Reed Knox, elder son of the cabinet member and confidential clerk to his father, is understood to have acted as the envoy and minister plenipotentiary for his father. Unconditional surrender of his own way in the world, procuring a situation with an automobile firm, were the only terms which young Philander would consider. Reed Knox said the terms would be accepted.

"That kid brother of mine is made of the right stuff. The way he handled the governor would make the average foreign diplomat look green in the game of diplomacy." The elder brother was in a position to understand and sympathize with young Philander. Reed Knox began his matrimonial venture in like manner. He eloped on Jan. 23, 1907, with Miss Elizabeth McCook, of Pittsburg. They were married in Alexandria, Va., and were at once received by Mr. and Mrs. Knox, senior.

The secretary is Fred P. Robinson, Fredericton.
