printed matter on both sides and
in more than one colour on and
after July 31, 1944, the fertilizer
Administrator announces. For-
mally, under the previous order,
the trademark or other informa-
tion could alone be printed in
block in one colour on one side of
the bag. The only provision was
originally intended to conserve
space for the manufacturer of the
product. It now seems to be adequate,
the restriction has been removed.
