### HANKOW PRESENTS DESOLATE SCENES

#### Starvation and Disease Follow in Wake of Yangtze River Floods—Visitor Tells Story

MONTREAL, Sept. 1.—Scenes of the most utter desolation, starvation and suffering along the Yangtze River caused by extensive flooding are described by Dr. W. W. Peter, Technical Adviser to the National Health Administration of the Nanking Government, China, who is now in Montreal as a delegate to the convention of the American Public Health Association.

Dr. Peter paid a visit by air to Hankow in August, and says there was flood water all the way on both banks of the river as far as the eye could see except in the hilly parts. Practically no houses could be seen on the plains; on top of the dykes were still large parts of roofs of houses and large numbers of newly-erected sheds, many of which were already immersed in water.

"There is no dry land in Hankow," said Dr. Peter. In fact the greater part of Hankow is deep in water up to the roofs of two storey buildings. Refugees were seen camped on the roofs of factory buildings and on slopes of hills. The view from the air is truly a terrifying sight.

Continuing, he said: "We visited the Hsin Sze Chang and the Benevolent Association where there were 3,000 to 5,000 refugees in each place. There is a terrible amount of crowding, particularly in the latter place. The other camps must be similar. As far as shelter and food are concerned these people are quite sufficiently provided for. There is, however, too much crowding, and nothing is done in connection with camp-sanitation, beyond the dispensing of some medicines periodically by the staff of the municipal hospital.

#### FLOOD RELIEF BOARD

"The provincial Flood Relief Commission, with Provincial Chairman Ho Chang-chun as chairman and headquarters at the Chamber of Commerce, is probably doing as good work as can be expected under the circumstances. Most of the refugees are in sheltered places and food is being distributed in the form of rations in some places and as grain (uncooked rice) in others. The total number of homeless people is estimated at 300,000 to 400,000, the large majority being in Huchang. There are probably less than 100,000 in Hankow and Hanyang combined.

"The Provincial Chairman says the local commission can carry on only for two or three weeks longer. Besides affording shelter and supplying food very little is being done for the refugees. There is no order, and in the schools and other public places which are being used as camps the people are over-running the places and listening to nobody. Nothing in regard to sanitation is done. The refugees are still fairly cheerful, because many still have savings in food or in some money, but it is feared that despair will be written over most of the faces soon.

#### MUCH DISEASE

"A conference with the leading doctors in the city including those in the large hospitals disclosed the fact that there is already considerable dysentery, typhoid fever, and all kinds of gastro-intestinal disorders. Bacillary dysentery is said to be much more common than amebiasis. Cholera, fortunately, has not made its appearance in its true form. Malaria is very common and the number of mosquitoes appalling and beyond imagination. Flies, on the other hand, are very scarce in Hankow. Skin diseases are very prevalent, especially sores on the feet. The people are not starving, but the absence of green vegetables and lack of the necessary vitamins will soon cause the appearance of

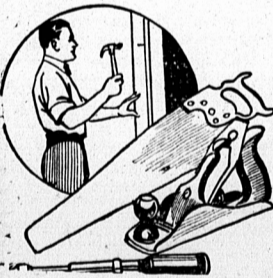

### Stricken With Appendicitis On Mountain

(By The Canadian Press)

KESWICK, Eng., Sept. 18.—While on the top of Scawfell Pike, the highest mountain in England, a Stoke-on-Trent girl, Miss Parker, was taken ill with appendicitis and had to be carried down on an improvised stretcher by the flickering light of an electric torch.

She had climbed the mountain with her fiancé, Mr. Maitchan, also of Stoke-on-Trent. Two other climbers hurried down to a farm and sent for a doctor and then returned with a stretcher made out of two pitch-forks and a sack, and with the help of Mr. Maitchan they carried her down the precipitous mountainside. The men also were exhausted and Miss Parker was suffering great pain when 1,800 feet down they met the ambulance men with a stretcher. Shortly afterwards the electric torches failed and they had to find their way down a narrow, rocky path with the light of one lantern.

They wandered off the path onto steep stretches, where the going was even more difficult, and it took the party two hours and a half to do a journey of three-quarters of an hour.

The deficiency diseases in large numbers unless something is done very quickly to provide the necessary requirements.

"There are very limited hospital accommodations in Hankow and Wuchang, even in normal times. The present time finds all the hospitals in Hankow flooded Hospital beds for temporary use, must be provided for immediately in order to be able to isolate cases of infectious disease and to limit their spread. The refugee camps are not being kept clean and they will become the centres of death very soon unless some sanitary arrangements are provided immediately.

"The present situation is more serious than can be gathered from reports, pictures or descriptions," concluded Dr. Peter. "Emergency relief on an extensive scale must be provided for and should consist of the gathering together of all the sufferers, food, order, and discipline, and public health measures. These measures must be fundamental, practical, and easy of operation. Preventive measures and general sanitary laws rigidly enforced are the things which keep down the morbidity and mortality rates; they are expensive but it has been proved that they have always paid in the end."

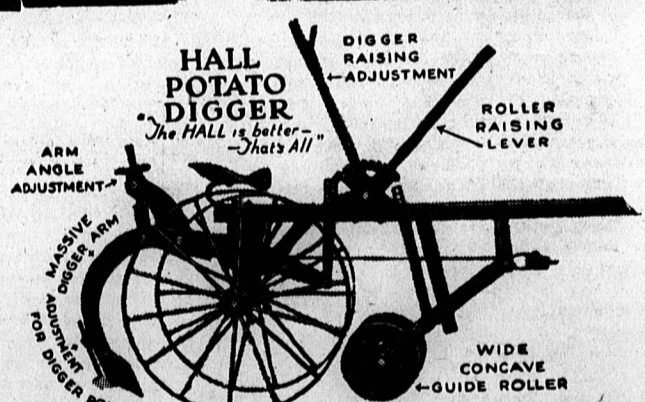
### Eastern Guardian
