SPRINGHILL proposes having a one day meeting on Sept. 5th, probably three classes and the usual three hundred dollar purses. Classes will be announced later. This is the annual Labor Day meeting, but it is called for the 5th inst, instead of the 7th on account of Halifax racing on the 9th, which will give horsemen an opportunity of resting and going down to Halifax before the opening of the exhibition.

The O'Leary District S. S. Association held its half yearly Convention in the Campbellton Presbyterian Church on Tuesday, July 28th. The day was fine and the attendance large. The following ministers were present: Rev. D. McLean and Rev. Mr. McDonald, Presbyterian; Rev. W. R. Pepper and Rev. Mr. Webber, Methodist. The following schools were represented, viz: Bloomfield Station, Bloomfield, Brae, Campbellton, Presbyterian; West Devon, Baptist; West Devon, Cape Wolfe, Barton, Springfield, Methodist. The following schools were not represented by delegates—Greenwood, O'Leary, Millburn, Presbyterian; Millburn, Knutsford, Methodist; Knutsford, Baptist; West Point Presbyterian. The following schools were reported as open all the year—Bloomfield, Presbyterian; Cape Wolfe, Methodist; West Point, Presbyterian; Millburn, Methodist; O'Leary, Presbyterian; West Devon, Methodist; West Devon, Baptist; Springfield, Methodist. The West Point, Presbyterian; and the Springfield, Methodist schools had each a Normal class and several members wrote the annual examinations. The Springfield Methodist school also has a Home Department of thirty one members and a Cradle Roll of fourteen. This is the first country school in this Province to have a Cradle Roll. The Cradle Roll has been instituted in the following town schools for some time, St. James and Zion Presbyterian, First and Grace Methodist and Baptist, Charlottetown. Presbyterian, Methodist and Christian, Summerside. The District President, Rev. W. R. Pepper, presided at both sessions. Rev. D. McLean read an excellent paper on "Class Work," in which he emphasized the necessity of thorough preparation of the lesson by the teacher, and the need of each one having a Bible in the class and not the lesson paper. At the evening session Rev. Mr. Webber, who has recently come from Wales and taken charge of the O'Leary Circuit, spoke of S. S. work in the Old Country. Rev. Mr. McDonald a student from Pine Hill Halifax spoke of the need of the Holy Spirit in S. S. teaching. The Field secretary was present and assisted at both sessions. The Campbellton school purchased a blackboard and map, which will aid much to the attractiveness of the room and aid in the work of teaching. The West Cape school has made a fine beginning of a Teachers' library, by getting the three well known books, Teaching and Teachers (Trumbull), The S. S. teacher, (Hamill) and the teaching problem, (Axtell). A vote of thanks was given to the choir for their excellent music which was highly appreciated by all. All felt that a very pleasant and profitable time had been spent, and the Campbellton pastor, Rev. D. McLean gave a standing invitation to hold the Convention there at any time.—W. E.
