IN MEMORIAM

MR. THOS. BEERS.

The Guardian records with sorrow the death of Mr. Thos. Beers, who passed to his eternal reward in this city on Friday last. The deceased had been in failing health for the past three years. During the winter he had the misfortune to fall and fracture his hip, which necessitated his being removed to the P. E. I. Hospital where he remained for three months. His rugged constitution bore him up for a time and his health improved sufficiently to permit his being removed from the hospital; but it became apparent on Monday that his end was approaching and he passed peacefully away on Friday. The funeral to Christ's Church Cemetery at Cherry Valley, on Sunday was largely attended. The service being conducted by the Rev. D. J. Jones.
