THE BIRTHRATE.—According to figures contained in the Canada Year Book for 1918, the birth rate per 1,000 is highest in Quebec, with 38.64 births per 1,000 living, and lowest in British Columbia with 13.12. Ontario stands at 24.14, Nova Scotia at 25.12, Manitoba at 33.85, Saskatchewan at 29.70, Alberta at 26.85 and Prince Edward Island at 17.04.
