LESS DAMAGING THAN EXPECTED

LONDON, Oct. 16 (CP)—German bombs are causing less damage and less loss of life than might be expected according to a Home Office report on emergency protection in factories.

It is generally imagined that in the case of a direct hit the buildings and its occupants are doomed. The report states: "This is not supported by the evidence obtained from a study of recent air raid damage."

There have been many cases of "hit-and-run" (about 32 pounds) bombs detonating on the thin corrugated roofing of single-storey factory buildings with little damage other than to the roof covering, and with very slight casualties. Similar bombs detonating on the floor of the shop removed the floor covering over a wide area but did not cause any damage to machinery. One heavy bomb, 250 lb (about 110 pounds), exploding on the floor, caused only local damage to machines and personnel.

There is very little danger of serious structural damage from a near miss. Very heavy bombs, 5,000 lb (about 2,200 pounds), falling within 33 feet of a workshop with corrugated iron walls did no more than strip the sheeting from the steelwork.

The report urged that water, electricity and gas services be duplicated to prevent complete stoppage by a bomb.
