**Contract Bridge**

**CHOICE OF SLAM CONTRACTS**

In today's deal, North's bidding was very good in a quantitative sense, but he went off in the wrong direction.

South dealer.  
 East-West vulnerable.

♠ A K 6 5 2	♥ Q 8	♦ K Q J 8	♣ K 7

West who had been practically told by the opponents' bidding what suit to lead, amiably opened a club, and the defenders thus snatched two club tricks before the declarer could even win the lead.

The inevitable postmortem quickly revealed that 12 top tricks would have been readily available if North had played the hand at six no-trump, and there was a somewhat bitter discussion over the failure to reach that contract.

North pointed indignantly to the fact that South, by jumping from three diamonds to four hearts, had shown a very strong hand including a long and good heart suit, and said that he felt safe at a six heart contract. He further argued that South might have had to establish the spade suit by ruffing, which of course could not be done at no-trump.

North was wrong on both counts, South had not shown a particularly powerful hand inasmuch as his first rebid had been a simple two hearts. North's real error, however, was in failing to appreciate the danger that South would turn up with a diamond instead of the club ace, and that with hearts as trump, the opening lead could be made through the club king. At no-trump, North could virtually count on 12 tricks and club control.
