ST. ANDREW'S DINNER HELD LAST NIGHT

A Bountiful Repast with Toast List of Speech and Song Enjoyed by the Large Number of Guests Present.

Some had meat and canna eat,
 And some would eat that want it;
 But we hae meet and we can eat,
 Sae let the Lord be thankit.

The annual dinner of the Caledonian Club, in honor of St. Andrew's day, was held last night at the Queen Hotel, where the brilliantly lighted dining hall was filled with some eighty of the Sons of the Land of the Heather and their guests. The menu was in the best style of the Queen, and due justice was done to the excellent repast between the hours of nine and eleven o'clock.

President McSwain presided having on his right Chief Stewart and Rev. T. F. Fullerton and on his left Rev. McLean Sinclair and Premier Farquharson. As the feast reached its climax the "great chieftain of the pudding race"—the haggis was brought in, this time with double honors, two pipers preceding the dish—Piper Ferguson of the Club and Piper McInnis of the Boy's Highland Brigade.

When the cloth was removed the President after words of welcome read letters of regret from Lieutenant Governor McIntyre, Consul Vall, Col. Irving and greetings from several sister societies.

Chief Stewart proposed the health of the King and in doing so said:
 Our memory takes us back to just one short year ago, when we met in this room and around this festive board to celebrate as we do tonight, the anniversary of Saint Andrew, Scotland's patron saint. On that occasion we drank the health of Her Majesty Queen Victoria and sang God Save the Queen. Since that time we have been called upon to mourn the death of our Beloved Victoria the Good, and with the notes of God Save the Queen still ringing in our ears and the memory of the late Queen resting on the words it was hard at first to sing or to say God Save the King. Yet while the nation still mourned the death of Queen Victoria they were proud of her noble son and successor and His Majesty Edward the Seventh

reigns today over the greatest Empire in the world. Never in the history of the nations did a Sovereign assume the Royal Scepter with greater quietness and becoming dignity and never was the Empire more loyal to the Throne than at the present moment. No Sovereign that ever ruled the British Nation had at his back a more solid and loyal host of

McDonald, Lord Strathcona, Gen. Hector McDonald and others and closed amid great applause.

Mr. James McIsaac of the Herald followed. He mentioned that though St. Andrew may not have visited Scotland relics of him were brought thither. He eulogised Scottish scenery, Scottish courage, and the illustrious names that Scotland had given to the world, great names in statesmanship, in arms and in literature, in philosophy, and not only good men but women as beautiful as any whose praises have been said or sung.

The health of the Governor General was next heartily honored, followed by Hall to the Chief from the pipes. Hon. A. McKinnon M. P. responded. He mentioned Lord and Lady Minto's visit to the Caledonian sports here last summer, and spoke of the importance of his office as a connecting link with the Mother Country. He thought the Canadians capable of both Canadian and imperial patriotism and spoke of the growth of imperial sentiment growing out of the Colonies taking part in the present war. It was midnight when Mr. McKinnon concluded amid hearty applause.

The health of the Lieutenant Governor was coupled with the names of Lieut. Col. Moore and Mr. Wheat, M. L. A. While Col. Moore was speaking the lights went out, and the period of darkness was employed by all in singing Annie Laurie.

The Land of Cakes and Brother Scots was drunk with the "honors three," and eloquently responded to by Mr. David S. Hall.

Many other toasts remained to be disposed of but too late to be noticed before the hour of THE GUARDIAN going to press. It was altogether a most successful banquet, a splendid repast, coupled with capital speaking and hearty good feeling.

It also recalled our noble Scottish ancestry whom the speaker warmly eulogised for their courage, fortitude and services to civil and religious liberty. The day was also one for feasting and joyfulness. St. Andrew was not an ascetic. Had he been a man who could not be joyful the Scottish people would not have taken him for their patron. John the Baptist was a little too fond of water for them. The speaker proceeded to speak of St. George, St. David, and St. Patrick all of whom he eulogised but gave the preeminence to St. Andrew. As to all who honor the day Scotchmen are everywhere. He instanced Sir Charles Napier, Sir William
