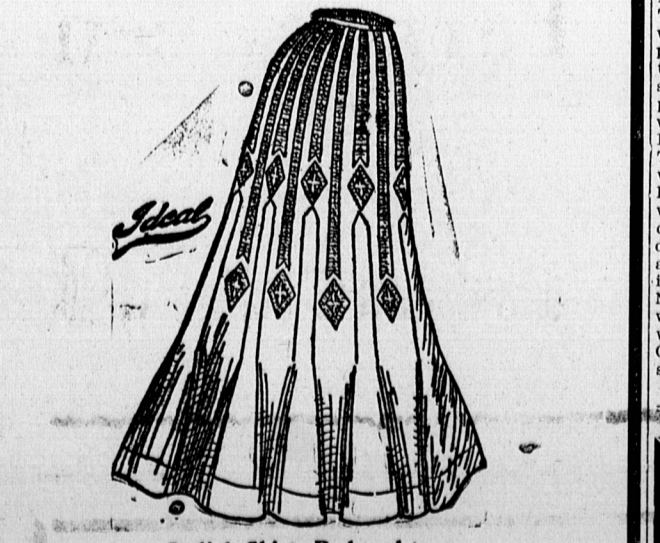

JAPAN INTENDS TO RULE ASIA.
LONDON, July 27—A writer in Le Matin, discusses the chances of Japan going to war. "Japanese zone of action," he continues, "is in China. The Japanese intend, at no matter what cost, to become the predominant Power in Asia. They will not yield to anything that will lead them away from Asia or weaken them in Asia. Now to be the predominant power in Asia means manifestly that they must become the master in China. For this reason, so long as China is non-existent from a military point of view, Japan's most dangerous enemy is still Russia. The Japanese realize clearly that such a vast power is not seriously crippled by a single war. They know Russia has always extended automatically toward Asia and that she is invading China as irresistibly as a rising tide. CHINA JAPAN'S LEVER. "It is China that the Japanese are compelled to remain on the alert in order to repel a Western invasion; for while we are talking of the 'yellow peril,' the Japanese dread the 'white peril.' They are arming China and are creating for her a corps of officers because they hope to find in her a sort of lever for their resistance to Russia. They are convinced that the Chinese army will not be in troops for a long time and perhaps will never be in that position. They will dominate over China and will make her feel their power but they will not make war upon her unless she seriously contests their supremacy. Even in that case it will be Russia that the Japanese will dread. Believe me, they are more concerned about the double line which is being laid on the Trans-Siberian Railway than about the arrival of the American fleet in the Philippines. The writer of Matin's article also calls attention to the economic reasons which will prevent Japan from going to war with the United States. Such a war, he declares, would give a death blow to her new born commerce and industry. "The Japanese," he says in conclusion, "are in a period of transition and of military and economic development. They will reappear upon the scene in a few years, but again it will be in Asia, and in China, that their cannon will be heard."
