ELECTORS OF FIFTH PRINCE POLITICAL MEETING IN B.I.S. HALL SOURS

Their catch as given to the lessee or holders of private areas. This power that they take to themselves can only be granted by the Dominion Government, and the Federal Government in fixing the time of marketing oysters considered that it was in the interests of the industry to have the Canadian product reach the market at the same time as that from the United States. As dealers naturally arrange for a regular supply during the season, and as American shippers were allowed to bring in their goods in September, while Canadians could not send theirs until October, it would mean the loss of a large market to the home product. At a conference with the Dominion Superintendent of Fisheries and representatives of the fishermen's Association with the local Government, the question was fully dealt with, and the fishermen requested that the season of taking oysters from the public beds be not changed. They argued that the shipping of oysters in September was attended with great risk on account of weather, but at the same time the growers could take risk and so retain the market for the native product and lessening some of the naturally arise if all shipments were delayed till October 1st. The present Government are only anxious to assist the fishermen and will support any change that the fishermen will agree upon with regard to the time and season of fishing on the public beds.

The Premier at the conclusion of his speech was given a magnificent ovation and round after round of applause.

He was followed by Mr. McNally, who made a brief speech, in the course of which he requested some of the Liberal plaudits, had to admit that the Government had done an excellent thing in securing the \$100,000 subsidy. The next speaker was Hon. James A. McNeil, Commissioner of Public Works, who gave an excellent review of the work of the Government during the past three years, confining himself principally to the magnificent performance of the Public Works Department in the construction of 2,400 feet of steel bridges as compared with 911 feet during all the 20 years of the former government. Lack of space regrettably precludes a more extended report of this address.

Mr. H. Howatt, the Liberal candidate, was the next speaker. He endeavoured to criticise the oyster regulations, but his criticism fell flat upon the lucid and many explanation given by the Liberal candidate, who was Hon. E. Wyatt, who having only a limited time as the hour was late, took every advantage of the opportunity to make a vigorous and impressive review of the Government's record, dealing in a masterly manner with some of the "economies" cut down teachers' salaries, thus driving them from P. E. Island. Under the old regime a first class teacher who was going to teach in P. E. Island, drew a second class salary for a year while the one who was going to teach out West got his first class certificate immediately. He went carefully over all the improvements in the educational system; how the people got all their school supplies at first cost. He explained that the Liberal Government did away with the Normal School, a most harmful act, and in place of it the Conservatives have the Summer School, where they learn the art of teaching school. The Liberal Government had to sue 1,200 to get them to pay their taxes; the present Government did not sue one and still they collected the taxes. He spoke at length on the improved agricultural system, of the mussel mud and of all the other advantages employed. In conclusion he explained fully the oyster scandal and denounced the Editor of the Patriot for his malicious mis-statement. Mr. Alex. Robinson, the Liberal candidate, following, stated that the Liberal Government cut \$200 each off the salaries of the Attorney General, Commissioner of Public Works and Minister of Education. He also made some remarks pertaining to his road district, Red Point, and criticized the road master there, (which occasioned great laughter from the audience.) Dr. A. McDonald, Mr. McLean's colleague followed and was given a great reception. He retorted beyond all doubt Mr. Robinson's charges and showed that where the Liberal Government saved \$600 in cutting salaries they at the same time went \$45,000 in debt. Mr. W. J. Brennan, Liberal candidate, spoke at some length on the deplorable extravagance of the present Government, telling all the Liberal government would do when they got into power. Some discussion then took place between Mr. J. J. Hughes and Hon. John McLean over the subsidy and other matters and finally the meeting closed with the National Anthem. On the whole the meeting was a great success for the present Government and for the Liberal Conservatives in general.

AUSTRIAN AND GERMAN ARMIES SEPARATE

(Special to the Guardian.)

LONDON, Sept. 3.—German and Austrian armies on the eastern front are about to part company, according to a despatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company from Amsterdam. This notes a message from Vienna announcing that Field Marshal Archduke Frederick, commander-in-chief of the Austrian army, had an official farewell to Field Marshal Von Mackensen, the German commander at Brest-Litovsk. Henceforth the armies of the two commanders will cease cooperating with each other. The message says it is believed the Austrian army will have been operating in Poland will shortly be removed in the direction of Serbia.

The joint meeting held at New Haven on the evening of the 1st inst, has been productive of the very best results. Mr. Mathieson's candidly presented the Government case. After the four candidates had spoken, Mr. Malcolm McNeil (Mac) was called upon from the audience and delivered a telling speech in which he commended the Government on its splendid record and the Conservative candidates on the unprecedented benefits they had obtained for the district. He instanced the wharves, the bridges and roads as the work with which the people were best acquainted, and stated that Premier Mathieson was the best this Island ever had and he did not believe there was his equal in all Canada.

BUCHAREST TREATY AGREED UPON

(Special to The Guardian)

ROME, Sept. 3.—The revision treaty of Bucharest has been agreed to explicitly by Serbia and Roumania and Greece, according to reports received here, but it is said these countries are not willing to satisfy entirely Bulgaria's claims for territorial compensation for participation in the war. Bulgaria's pretensions are apparently irreconcilable with what her neighbours are willing to grant and the impression is gaining ground here that she is prolonging negotiations with the aim of postponing the day when she must reach a decision.
