MARKETING OF PELTS.—Mr. Chester McLure, Manager of the Fur Sales Board, was in consultation this week with the members of the Fox Breeders' Association, residing in Summerside, with a view to finding out if they would cooperate this season in marketing their fox pelts through the Sales Board. Dr. Jardine occupied the chair and about 25 others were present. Mr. McLure addressed the meeting, explaining the work of the Board. He strongly emphasized the advantage which the Board afforded in having the pelts properly distributed in the Fur Market. He also clearly showed that the best interests of the industry, both with regard to prices, and maintaining the reputation of the Island pelts lies in patronizing the Board. After a general discussion the meeting unanimously decided that the Fur Sales Board must be retained as it was absolutely necessary for the continuance of the industry on a proper commercial basis.

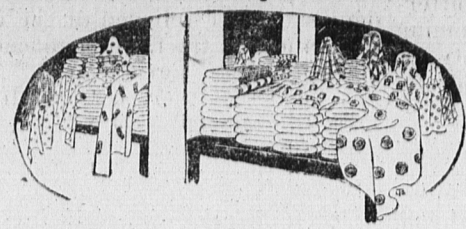
