## Capt. Stanley Bagnall Describes Air Fight

Following are extracts from a letter received by Dr. Bagnall from his son, Capt. Stanley Bagnall:

Do you know that one of our first impressions of France is one of surprise. After all we have read, it would not seem possible that there could be any green fields or habitable houses anywhere near the firing line.

I have seen the French people cultivate their fields up to a point where one would think it futile to even venture let alone work. Yet, they peace fully carry on work in front of villages that now look no more like homes than the sand castle the little child has made and then kicked to pieces. At any moment a stray shell may kill or wound them. And I have known more than one civilian to be wounded.

Their methods of cultivation are much different to ours. There are fewer weils and grading lands are almost absent. The crops are much the same except that they grow far more peas and beans, and one does not see as much hay or turnips. Hay fields on the whole seem to contain clover without timothy. All crops even to the grain are hoed, and cultivated with a hand machine, which I find hard to describe, it is very closely resembling it.

Something like a scuffer, but much lighter in build. This is pushed by hand between the rows of grain. The work is largely done by women. The country abounds in ditches and moisture would not seem to be a great proposition. We have had over two weeks of dry, hot weather, yet the grain is not apparently in want of water.

Crops are well advanced and early grain should be ready for cutting by the end of the month.

We have seen thrilling sights and perhaps the greatest show yet is an air attack on an observation balloon. I wonder if I can picture it to you. Imagine a great long bag, shaped something like a sausage, perhaps four times as long as it is broad. This is attached to a long steel cable and always gently aways up in the air. Underneath is suspended a basket in which are two observers, each with his parachute strapped to him, and always ready to jump to earth on a two seconds' warning. Can you realize what it means to look over the edge to the earth several thousand feet below, and wonder what will happen should your parachute fail to open when you jump? Suddenly someone gives an excited shout, and everyone strains his eyes till he sees a small speck far above the balloon and towards the enemy. Already there are little puffs of smoke bursting around him. For it is a Bosche, and our Archies are watching. But he rushes onwards towards the balloon, then one sees two figures leap from the basket, a terrifying distance, and then, thank goodness! their parachutes have opened. Now all around the balloon there are puffs of smoke and angry bursts of flame. It is our Archies putting a barrage fire around the balloon. The Bosche keeps on, and shells are bursting all around him, but he keeps on. Then you see tiny spurts of flame leave his machine and go towards the balloon. These are incendiary bullets of some type. He holds his course and passes right over the balloon several hundred feet above it. Still the balloon stays in position. Then the Bosche circles around and comes back over the balloon again. And as soon as he is in position fires again. All this time the shells are bursting around him, but he bears a charmed life. This time it does not last long, a tiny spurt of flame appears right at the top of the balloon, and the Bosche heads direct for his own lines. Of course it is not always thus. He attempted the same stunt on two other evenings and failed each time. And always our brave R.F.C. are duplicating the same stunt on his side of the lines. It is a corner of war.

Our chaps have fought a pitched battle, it lasted all through one night and a good many of the enemy were killed, but finally our men retired. The rats had won the day, so now they are in a new billet, which is the best one they have yet had. I wonder if the people at home do not worry too much. Of course we are always in danger. But the life as yet has not been nearly as dangerous or as uncomfortable as we had expected.

My, how everyone looks for the mail! It is the great event over here. Sometimes there is no Canadian mail for a fortnight at a time and everyone gets in the dumps. Why, to tell you the quarter of what we think of them would require a special letter in itself. Christmas eats then socks and now eats and smokes. It is worth all that we are likely to go through to know that there are so many kind-hearted people in our home province. And now we are all sure that there is no place like "Home Sweet Home" and our island province by the sea. We are all very grateful to the ladies who compose the 8th Siege Battery Auxiliary and I am sure they would feel repaid for all their work if they could see the happy smiles

When their good things are distributed. With love, Stanley.
