GEORGE MACDONALD, son of Theophilus Macdonald, of Kingsboro, P. E. I., and an employe of the Canadian Pacific Railroad, was killed in Montreal on the morning of July 25th. He was coupling cars at the time. In some way he was thrown upon the track under the train, and was so badly crushed that he survived the accident only a few minutes. W. H. MacInnis, Cumberland County, Nova Scotia, a personal friend and fellow-employe of the deceased, took charge of the body, and with a kindness never to be forgotten accompanied the remains home. The deceased was twenty-four years of age, exemplary in character, and greatly beloved by all who knew him. The burial took place on Sunday, July 30th, at South Lake Church. The funeral procession was the largest ever seen in the community. The bereaved family have the sympathy of a great multitude in their great sorrow. It is with deep regret The Guardian chronicles the death of Duncan Kennedy for the last seventeen years the efficient and faithful caretaker of the Provincial Building which sad event occurred early yesterday morning. The deceased had been in gradually failing health for the past seven months and although able to be out some weeks ago and he gradually failed till death called his spirit away. The late Mr. Kennedy was a quiet, unassuming gentleman, a worthy man and a good citizen, generally esteemed among a wide circle of friends and acquaintances who will mourn his loss. There are left to mourn a sorrowing widow, and four sons, viz. John with Gates & Co's, Alfred at John McLeod & Co, Joseph in Glace Bay and Donald in Warden, B. C. They have the sympathy of all in their bereavement.
