A ROYAL COMMISSION ON RE-ESTABLISHMENT

Canadian ex-service men have been enquiring as to the exact scope of the Royal Commission which is to investigate in the first instance G.W.V.A. charges against the Board of Pension Commissioners. With the changes made in the report of the special parliamentary committee on pensions, insurance and re-establishment, following the withdrawal of the amendment proposed by J. T. Shaw of Calgary, the composition and work of the Commission as approved by the House of Commons is as follows:
"That there be forthwith appointed by the government a commission to consist of three persons in no way to be connected with the government or any department thereof, and that such commission be appointed to give all necessary authority to inquire into the allegations and accusations made to render its report containing such recommendations as to what procedure it may think proper to have adopted with power to send for all necessary persons and documents."
"To consider and make suggestions in respect of the procedure by which disabled ex-members of the C.E.F. are enabled to make application for pension and medical treatment, or submit appeal in respect of decisions thereon."
"To recommend means for insuring that suitable provision is made for all those ex-members of the forces and dependents who are under serious handicap by reason of war service, in conformity with the recommendations now made by the special committee of parliament, and for whom definite legislative provision has not yet been made."
"And the findings of such commission shall be acted upon by the government."
"For the above purposes the commission shall (1) Survey existing re-establishment needs among Canadian ex-service men and dependents; (2) Investigate available data in respect of phases of the parliamentary enquiry as yet incomplete; (3) Obtain information as regards suitable provision for those classes of ex-service men described in section 7, chapter 2, of the report of the parliamentary committee of 1922; investigate the question of the canteen funds."
(Section 7, chapter 2, referred to, deals with those men requiring sheltered employment and special care not otherwise provided for.
G.W.V.A. officials claim that the decision to broaden the work of the Royal Commission in effect is the granting of a request from that association which has been advanced at every session of parliament since 1918.
