France, 20-1-18.

My dear former pupils,—Among my many pleasant surprises at the Christmas season there was none which afforded me greater pleasure than the parcel and letter from my old pupils. My thoughts very often wander back to the old school and I have sometimes wondered just what changes there is wrought among you and how many of my old friends were left. As I have been away now for a considerable time, I thought perhaps I had been altogether relegated to the past in your minds, so it was all the greater pleasure to receive the evidence of your remembrance and good wishes in the large supply of cards and friendly little notes. You cannot tell just what a joy it brought to me to know that though out of your sight and life for the time being, I am not entirely forgotten.

It makes me wish again that I were back with you, that I might have the privilege of assisting in laying the foundation of your education, which is the determining factor in your future life. And I realize the more what I am missing because I know there are some among you, yes, many, who have latent powers and abilities within you that should not be allowed to go uncultivated merely for the lack of stimulus and opportunity.

The event of our life over here is leave to England, Italy, etc., after about a year here without leave. Mine is coming, I expect, on the 29th of this month, and I intend going to England and Scotland.
