The sailing of the S. S. Parthian which was going to replace the S. S. Halifax, as announced in last evening's papers, has been cancelled. There will be no sailings next week, the next sailing being the S. S. Aranmore, Nov. 28. This steamship has large freight accommodation and shippers would do well to book space immediately.

The Court of Chancery was engaged yesterday hearing an application in a case brought by a man named John Brown against Joseph Purcell, Pownall Street, to set aside an assignment of mortgage given by Brown to Purcell. Brown is now a patient in the Charlottetown Hospital and an order was made to take his evidence in that institution today.

A QUIET wedding took place on Wednesday last at six o'clock in the morning at the home of Gordon Doekendorff, North River, when his sister, Laella, was united in marriage to Walter B. Scott of the same place. Rev. David Price officiated, and immediately after the ceremony, and wedding breakfast was served. The happy couple left at half past eight by the Princess on a short trip through Nova Scotia.
