Brooklyn Nears Top In National League Race

Brooklyn came within 1-2 games of New York Giants in the National League yesterday by a 7-4 decision that snapped Van Mungo's six-game winning streak. Mungo was clubbed from the hill in the third when the Dodgers scored four to overcome an early 2-0 lead as Goodie Rosen's two-run single tied the count and Dixie Walker's double off the right field wall put the Brooks out front by two tallies.

Manager Leo Durocher, out on \$100 bail in a felonious assault charge, was back on the Brooklyn coaching lines for the first time since Saturday night's disturbance.

A Boston-Philadelphia Philadelphia Phils broke their own record for straight losses when they were shut out 10-0 by the Braves' Johnny Hutzinger.

It was the cellar-dwelling Phils' 16th consecutive loss, one more than their record of 14 established in 1933, which the Quakers equaled in 1936.

The Phils, however, have an unfinished game in the books. They were leading the Pirates 11-9 in Pittsburgh June 3 when the game was suspended because of wet grounds because of Pennsylvania's Sunday law. That contest will be completed in Pittsburgh July 12.

"The race will be between this horse and Hoop Jr. in Saturday's Kentucky Derby. 'He's ready to go.'"

Woolf rode Pavot to his greatest victories in his unbeaten two-year-old career and the better birds figured the two horses would be close co-favorites when the writing comes. Arcaro must keep an engagement to ride Devil Dancer in Saturday's suburban at Belmont.

Pavot, with his exercise boy, Orlando Hearn, carried 120 pounds as compared with the 126 he will have in the Preakness. He jogged around the oval once, then cut loose on a soft track.
