EQUALS THE TRACK RECORD

Jeanette Royal Travels Fast a Frederickton Yesterday to Equal Track Record Held By Single G. Igo, Former Island Owned Horse Wins 2.24 Class in Straight Heats.

FREDERICTON, N. B., Sept. 21—The Frederickton Exhibition race meet closed this afternoon with the high light furnished by Jeanette Royal, the Boston mare equalling the race record of the Frederickton track, when in the second heat of the free-for-all she covered the mile in 2.04 1/2. That time was first made over the local track by Single G. a few years ago and last year again by Ruby P. in a fiercely contested free-for-all.

This afternoon Jeanette Royal had everything which was required to handle the fast free-for-all field. Jeanette Royal gave a great demonstration. In the second heat she was running at the start and fell back before she steadied, but pulled up to equal the track mark.

The 2.16 trot and pace was the only event to split. Kazoff won the first heat, but Peter Tanlac the next three. In the second, Kazoff finished in second position, but was set back to last for interference with Major S. the Glace Bay entry driven by Tom Holmes.

Monte Gerow beat a big field in the 2.24 trot with Igo taking three heats. His best time was in the last, 2:12 1/2.

A colt race for three-year-olds was won by Lee Scott, a Vermont colt, with Danny Steele driving.

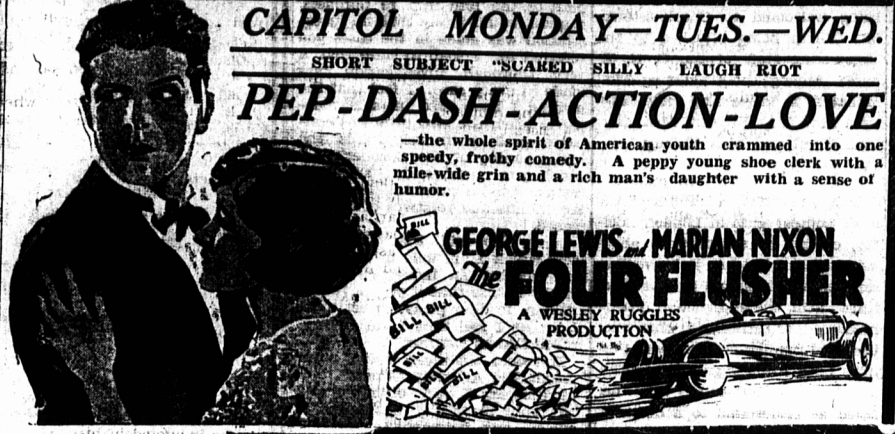

Mr. Sharpe who thirty years ago was with R. T. Holman, Ltd., Summerside, is now a breeder of thoroughbred cattle owning upwards of sixty prize winners and while away in Scotland he and his travelling companion Mr. Yule purchased another thirty-five head of cattle, eighteen bulls, 17 females, which is said to be one of the best bunches of short-horn cattle in the Dominion. Included in the shipment was the Reserve Grand champion cow of the Highland show last year and she was first as a yearling and a two year old, at the same show. Mr. Sharpe visited the King's farm at Windsor, and the Prince of Wales farm at Nottingham and all the large breeding establishments in Scotland. Mr. Sharpe has started threshing with a yield of 40 bushels to the acre for Garnet.
