## Editor Gets \$250 And Apology From Council

VALLEYFIELD, Que., December 15.—"Unanimously regretting" a resolution passed at a meeting of City Council on November 30, in which Aime Laurion, editor of the Valleyfield Gazette, was indefinitely banned from all future meetings as a "nuisance," the members of the Council, at its regular session held tonight, passed a second resolution nullifying the first and recommending that the city pay \$250 to the newspaperman in settlement of a \$5,000 action for damages filed against the city earlier in the week.

Arrangements for the settling of the damage action out of court were discussed at a closed meeting of Council immediately prior to the regular session, and at which Laurion and his legal counsel attended. Laurion, through his counsel, said he would accept the \$250 settlement, "knowing that the city was not in a position to pay the \$5,000 claim."

The apologetic resolution passed tonight followed the announcement that Mayor J. A. Loran had served notice on the City Clerk refusing to sign the minutes of the November 30 meeting on the grounds that Council meetings were open to the public, and that no citizen could be elected from such meetings unless he was creating a disturbance. The resolution was moved by Ald. Gentran Hebert and seconded by Ald. Eustache Langevin, moving a second resolution, respectively of the "nuisance" resolution passed at the previous meeting.

The resolution read in part: "The Council unanimously regrets the attitude taken by the City Council concerning the representative of the Valleyfield Gazette, and also regrets the terms of the resolution adopted during the regular meeting of November 30, in which this newspaper was termed a nuisance to the good administration of the City, and in which the resolution was passed expelling from the chamber of deliberation for as long as the Council decided."

It continued with the request that the first resolution be nullified and that the city treasurer be instructed to pay Mr. Laurion the \$250 amount in settlement of the damage action. It was understood that the settlement figure was to cover costs as well.

The original resolution, banning Laurion, was passed in protest to an article which the newspaperman had written in his publication, in which he criticized the city administration and in which he particularly named Aldermen Hebert and Langevin.

## Coster Is Linked With Former Swindle

NEW YORK, Dec. 15.—(AP)—F. Donald Coster, indicted president of the vast McKesson and Robbins Drug Corporation was identified from fingerprints as the man who was charged in 1913 with grand larceny in the financial collapse of the \$1,000,000 United States Hairdressing Company.

In the Hairdressing Company scandal, Musica was convicted three years after his arrest, said Inspector Joseph Donovan, and received a suspended sentence.

Donovan added police records also disclosed that Coster, under the name of Musica, was sentenced to a year in jail and fined \$5,000 in 1906 in a federal grand larceny case, and that in 1920 he was charged with perjury, the records showing no disposition of the case.

## Duplessis Charges King Cabinet With Seeking Disunity

QUEBEC, Dec. 15.—(CP)—Premier Maurice Duplessis declared today that any talk of a conspiracy between Ontario and Quebec against Prime Minister Mackenzie King was "ridiculous" and that such talk appeared to be an effort to bring about disunity. Quebec's Union Nationale Premier, who previously headed the Conservative Party in this Province, met only briefly with newspapermen to comment on speeches made last Saturday by Transport Minister Howe and Labor Minister Rogers who charged a conspiracy existed between the two Provinces to overthrow Canada's Prime Minister.

"It is not true that there is a conspiracy between Premier Hepburn and myself in connection with the leadership or replacement of Premier Mackenzie King," Federal Liberal leader Premier Duplessis told newspapermen whom he had summoned to his office this talk is ridiculous and Quebec is not a party to any such plot for men who are preaching the unity of Canada to try by somewhat unusual talk and because of their nightmare to seek to bring about disunity in Canada. It would look like an effort to bring about disunity through grouping the other provinces against Ontario and Quebec.

Since its election in 1936 the Union Nationale Government of Quebec has established a bond of co-operation with Ontario, Duplessis added. "Promotion of the welfare of both provinces for the benefit of the populations of both provinces has been the sincere wish of both provinces."

"It is no directed against anyone, and we will continue to co-operate. We also are willing to co-operate with every other Province in Canada on a fair and sound basis for the progress of Canada as a whole."

## Champion Jersey Cow

The Maritime Provinces has a new champion producing Jersey cow, in the grand champion at the recent Maritime Winter Fair, Lily's Standard Topsy, bred and owned by Harold Stead, Charlottetown, P. E. I.

Topsy made the Maritime show circuit during her record, and 365 days produced 18,547 lbs. of milk, 890 lbs. of fat, with an average test of 4.8 per cent. Not only is she the champion Jersey producer of the Maritime Provinces but she is the world's record milk producer in her class in Canada, beaten only by the world's record milk producer, Bampton Favorite Girl, with a record of 19,175 lbs. of milk, 875 lbs. of fat, with an average test of 4.8 per cent.

Topsy is a daughter of the grand champion bull, Brampton Lily Standard, that Mr. Stead purchased from B. H. Bull & Son, Brampton, Ontario. This great sire, probably the greatest Jersey bull ever used in the Maritime Provinces, was sired by Standard of Oakland, himself winner of many championships, a gold and silver medal imported sire with sixty tested daughters, and his descendants have been scattered wherever Jerseys are known.

The dam of Lily's Standard Topsy is Daisy Milnor, an untested daughter of Fontaine's Chief. It will be remembered that Fontaine's Chief was the sire that first made Stead's head promise in the Maritime Jersey circles. He sired the grand champion cow, Brackley Ada and Brackley Ruth. Ada was grand champion as a two year old and she is still the champion milk producer in her class for her breed in the East. As a junior two year old she produced 12,588 lbs. of milk and 671 lbs. of fat, winning a silver medal certificate.

It is easily understood therefore where Lily Standard Topsy gets her outstanding type and production, both through her sire and her dam. Mr. Stead reports that Topsy will freshen in time to qualify for her silver, gold and medal of merit certificate.
