GROGER FOULLY MURDERED IN MONTREAL

Crime Committed By Three Bandits Who Robbed Their Victim of \$1,000 Which Police Later Recovered.

AXE USED Dead Man Discovered in Pool of Blood With Head Almost Severed From Shoulders.

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, Que., Dec. 31.—Fabien Martin, grocer, was found with his skull crushed in and his throat cut from ear to ear in his store here today.

The body was discovered by A. Brousseau on his way to work who saw three men wearing caps drawn over their eyes and collars upturned, making a hurried flight from the victim's grocery store, leaving the door open.

Detectives believe that the brutal crime was committed shortly after Martin had opened his store for the day's business, the three men following him into his store and striking him with the axe from behind.
