Irish Leaders Violent Attack A Surprise DUBLIN, Aug. 31.—Optimism in Dublin over the Irish peace negotiations received a shock yesterday when John McNeill, speaker of the Irish Republican Parliament, in introducing a deputation from Tyrone and Fermanagh counties to De Valera, Irish Republican leader, delivered a violent attack against Premier Lloyd George. Speaker McNeill said the British Premier's words in his recent letter to Mr. De Valera in which he mentioned the possibility of civil war, would be taken in Belfast as an incitement to fanatical violence, which the speaker declared had been the outcome of the British policy. It will not prevent civil war, the Dail speaker declared, but prepare for it. The British Government has been disarming all except its own friends, and arming special police organizations in the Orange lodges who would be let loose upon the unarmed population. De Valera confined his reply to assuring them that the Dail Cabinet was aware of their situation.

HAS \$60,000 COMING WANDERS IN ONTARIO TORONTO, Aug. 31.—E. Earle Axtell is in Toronto searching for Milan E. McCulloch, son of Dr. George McCulloch, of Hamestown, Iowa, who has been missing since December, 1919, and for whom a small fortune is waiting in his home town. The missing man made a small investment a few years ago, which has grown to \$60,000, but he has neglected to claim it. McCulloch is a graduate of an Iowa agricultural college, and is 37 years of age. His people heard from him from Toronto and Sudbury in the fall of 1919. They fear he is suffering from loss of memory.
