Enemy Troop Train Shot Up By Fighters

Vichy says Axis landing large formations on Tunisian Coast, Fighting Spreads.

LONDON, Nov. 24—(CP)—The African second front fighting spread over almost all Tunisia today and blazed fiercest on a new sector in the south of the French protectorate where Allied paratroops broke up an Axis mechanized column and supporting fighter planes shot up an Axis troop train.

The paratroops, identified by an Allied African headquarters spokesman as American, were guarding an airfield when they engaged the Axis column.

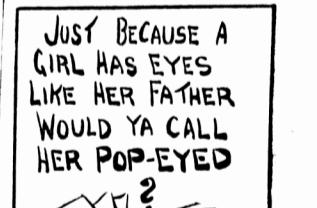
International At A Glance

(By The Canadian Press) RUSSIA—Reds increase Nazi casualties to 71,000 in three days, threatening major disaster to Germans on whole Stalingrad salient and in Caucasus. AFRICA—Allied paratroops smash Axis mechanized column in Tunisia; British 8th Army continues pursuit of Rommel's forces, occupying Acedabia in Cirenaica. NEW GUINEA—Australians and Americans intensify assault on Gona and Buna; Japanese retreats to hold last precarious footholds on island. SOLOMONS—Japs yield ground to Americans on Guadalcanal as U.S. Navy's blockade appears to have isolated them.
