We have checked with the Experimental Farm, with the Fertilizer plants, and they advise us to notify and recommend to the farmers who have their sets cut and are using chemicals, to plant their Potatoes with the Fish, Super and Soda now. Later on, when the Ammonia arrives, to sow it in the drills between the Potatoes; then, immediately afterwards, scuffle lightly or preferably, hill lightly.

1941: A Production "Pipe Dream" 1942: The Dream Is Coming True

When President Roosevelt first suggested that we build fifty thousand planes in one year, to help defeat Hitler the idea evoked a wave of often caustic humor. It was, we agreed with unusual unanimity, a novel way of trying to awaken the American public.

But even for the queen of industrial nations, it was a pipe dream. In 1941, the year whose midway mark is nearing, we shall manufacture not fifty thousand airplanes, but sixty thousand.

A year ago now we were scoffing or weeping, as our personal temperaments dictated, at the battle of Big Promises versus Small Performances then under way in Washington. "On hand or order" became a joke tending to the scandalous. With all our appropriations and orders, we could manage to spend for one-ply paper goods no more than \$35,500,000 a day.

In April, 1942, we spent \$131,600,000 a day.

PRODUCTION OUTSTRIPS FINEST DREAMS

We are taking a terrible beating in the Far East and operating under wraps in planning the offensive that is to whip Hitler in Europe, because we started preparations too late and too slowly.

But since the Japs jarred us awake last December, the American industrial machine has rolled at an ever-increasing tempo such as the most visionary never conceived as possible.

Many of the facts which underlie this statement are military secrets. Enough lie in the public domain to prove that while we still have a huge task ahead, at least we're well underway.

In 1939 our manufacturers turned out \$225,000,000 worth of planes. Last year we produced eight times as many. This year we are tripling the 1941 output.

Ernest Bevin, deputy premier of Great Britain, said in mid-April that within five or six weeks— he meant, but did not say, when Henry Ford's huge plant starts producing 3 the United States alone would be making as many planes as Germany, Italy and Japan combined.

SAVE NINE MONTHS ON BOMBER ENGINES

We are manufacturing tanks so fast that in two months we can supply the full requirements of the present American army. We

As a matter of fact, we alone have half again the steel capacity of Germany (including Poland and Czechoslovakia) plus Japan and Italy, plus France and Belgium plus the minor sources which Hitler controls by coercion or conquest.

We can get maximum use of our steel plant because we are short of scrap. But there it is.

Although the rate of sinkings by Nazi subs remains high, our shipyards are racing them with desperate speed. Day after day scores appear of marvelous new records made in launching ships ahead of schedule. One eastern plant is approaching the three-week point on 10,000 ton carriers. A southern shipyard has a contrast on which Washington expects a 10,000-tonner to hit the water every day once the assembly line has begun to roll.
