CREDIT MEN'S ASSOCIATION—Mr. Henry Detchon, general manager of the Canadian Credit Men's Trust Association, Ltd., an institution consisting of 1,900 wholesale houses throughout the Dominion, accompanied by Mr. F. G. Clennett, manager of the Halifax office, spent Thursday and Friday in Charlottetown completing the organization of the P. E. I. branch of the Association, and in installing Mr. H. K. S. Hemming as local manager. A meeting of the members of the Association was held in Mr. Hemming's office on Friday afternoon when Mr. Detchon gave a most interesting address on the question of credit throughout the Dominion, and the need for every possible means of preventing fraud through such acts as the Bulk Sales Act, the registering of mortgages, bills of sale and chattel mortgages, the Creditors Relief Act, the Debt Adjustment Act, etc. Mr. Detchon felt that local conditions on the Island are in a much less depressed state than in other provinces, especially in the Prairies where there is a practical moratorium of all debtors. Mr. Detchon left for Montreal on Saturday morning's train.

Barter Contract In Newfoundland

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., April 1.—(C.P.)—While half the world talks about barter schemes, the Newfoundland government is putting through one that works.

Instead of sending money out of the country for fuel, as they have been doing for years, the government's railways commissioners are exchanging Newfoundland mine pitprops for Welsh coal. There is no guess work about it; the contract has been drawn up, and the commission will have 91,900 tons of props ready for the mines in May. Delivery will commence about May 15.

To secure the pitprops, the railway commissioners awarded sub-contracts to more than 15 operators and thus created works for hundreds of men during the winter. Keen observers around the government buildings see a three-fold advantage for Newfoundland in this barter contract: cheaper coal, employment for woodmen, and the benefits of increased buying power for hundreds of families by keeping the money within the country. In addition, steamers taking props to England will have a return cargo of coal, probably cutting the existing coal freight rate in half.
