In Memoriam

G. R. MORRISON The many friends and associates of G. R. Morrison were shocked and saddened when they learned, by press and radio, of his death in the City Hospital on New Year's Eve, 1939, and had gone forth of his serious illness following an operation, but no one was prepared for the sad news that he had been called by death.

The deceased, eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. Allan Morrison of Savage Harbor was forty five years of age. After graduating from St. Dunstan's in Toronto, Ont., following which he entered the employ of the Souris Drug Co., later moving to Massachusetts where he continued in the Pharmaceutical profession. In 1930 he returned to this province and engaged in business both at St. John's and Tignish. In 1933 he purchased the business establishment of the Souris Drug Company and in that town at the time of his death, he was a prosperous and up to date pharmacist.

He was deeply interested in all that pertained to the Pharmaceutical Association and was very highly regarded by his fellow members who evinced their respect for his death, by the presence of a large number of members in attendance at his funeral. In succession, vice-president and president of that body and retaining him on the board of directors.

Besides the interests of his profession he was active in all that related to public welfare, and all appeals to him in that matter met with a ready and earnest response. A member of the town council of Souris, he was never so happy as when planning for whatever improvements were considered in our town.

At home and in public his manner was ever calm, serene and kind. Adversity in business he met with courage and patience, success he accepted with quiet satisfaction. That he will be greatly missed by those among whom he lived is evidenced by the words heard even from those who knew him best: "His was a good life, he was a fine Christian gentleman and a true friend."

He leaves to mourn their loss his wife, formerly Miss Josephine MacEwen, his father and mother and four brothers, James, Charles, Cyril and John.

On New Year's eve his remains were conveyed from the deceased's funeral home, Charlottetown, to his home in Souris where they rested until the following Friday and during that time a large number of members of people came to the side of the bier, many with tear dimmed eyes, to gaze upon the form of him for whom they mourned.

On January 3rd at 8.45 A.M. the funeral procession formed at the house and with the Knights of Columbus at the head slowly and solemnly proceeded through the streets of the town to St. Mary's Church, where Requiem High Mass was celebrated by Rev. E. O'Hanley, assisted by Rev. J. D. Hayes and Rev. Leonard MacDonald, St. Charles. Interment was in the adjoining cemetery where prayers at the grave were recited by Rev. E. O'Hanley.

CHAIRMAN OF THE CENTRAL COUNCIL AND EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF THE CANADIAN RED CROSS SOCIETY. Norman Sommerville, M.A., K.C. Mr. Sommerville, M.A., K.C., who is addressing Rotarians at noon on Monday and a meeting of the Red Cross in the evening is one of the most prominent lawyers in Canada. He was a Gold Medalist of Trinity College, Toronto, where he graduated in 1899, and an Honor Graduate in Law at Osgoode Hall in 1902. He was created a King's Counsel in 1921. He has always been noted for his interest in public affairs. He is a Past President of the Empire Club and of the Toronto Rotary Club. He gave the greatest service to his country during the Great War, especially in raising money for patriotic purposes. He took a most prominent part in the organization and promotion of the Patriotic Fund and was Chief Organizer of the Victory Loan campaigns in 1917 and 1918. He delivered a hundred addresses in the United States during the Great War and was chairman of the Niagara Parks Board for the province of Ontario in 1933. Mr. Sommerville's connection with the Canadian Red Cross Society began early in the Great War. In 1920 he was elected Honorary Solicitor and put at the disposal of the Society his great legal powers. In 1930 he was elected to the chairmanship of the National Council and Central Executive of the Society and found in these offices new opportunities for serving the public. He is superbly fitted for leadership in a humanitarian organization. Not only does he direct the Canadian Red Cross in such a way as to produce sound organization and effective administration, but he is ever vigilant to see that human sympathy is never lacking. Mr. Sommerville's contribution to the Red Cross has not been confined to his own country. In 1939 he attended the British Empire Red Cross Conference in London and gave invaluable help in the design and effective administration of the liberations of that body of the chief speaker at the grand banquet and was afterwards commended by the King, the Queen, the King of the Belgians and the King of the Netherlands. He also attended the 16th International Red Cross Conference in June 1938 as a representative of the Canadian Red Cross Society.

Canadian Field Crops Gross Value in 1940 According to the first official estimate, the principal field crops produced in Canada in 1940 have a gross value of \$948,285,000 which is 3 per cent below the revised gross value of the 1939 production of \$969,672,000. Apart from 1939, the 1940 value of field crops is the highest since 1930 when field crop production was valued at \$662,040,900. By provinces, the value of field crop production in 1940 was: "one Edward Island, \$8,289,000 a decrease of 28 per cent; Nova Scotia, \$13,200,000 an increase of 7 per cent; New Brunswick, \$20,540,000 a decrease of 0.5 per cent; Quebec, \$87,249,000 a decrease of 6 per cent; Ontario, \$139,254,000, a decrease of 7 per cent; Manitoba, \$61,937,000 an increase of 1 per cent; Saskatchewan, \$167,014,000 a decrease of 7 per cent; Alberta, \$136,225,000, an increase of 12 per cent; British Columbia, \$14,487,000, an increase of 1 per cent. These estimates are subject to revision and do not represent cash income received from sales but are gross values of farm production. Several of the crops such as mixed straw, turves and feed, etc. are almost wholly utilized on the farms on which they are grown.

Live Stock Situation Increased Marketings Comparing 1940 with the previous year, more money was paid to Canadian farmers from the sales of live stock. The increased marketings of live stock were sold at higher prices. Cattle sales at stockyards and on direct shipment to packing plants in 1940 were 1,149,255 head compared with 1,061,976 in 1939. Prices of these cattle in the period under review were more attractive than those prevailing in 1939. Calf marketings were 829,621 compared with 790,461 and these calves also brought increased remuneration. Deliveries of hogs to stockyards and packing plants were 5,577,810 as against 5,371,061 in 1939. The year record. Sheep and lamb deliveries were 762,875 and 745,500 respectively. Exports of beef cattle from Canada to the United States fell off sharply due to the fact that prices were more attractive in some, a result of an increased demand for meats brought about by the increase in employment which treated increased purchasing power. Exports of beef cattle to the United States were 128,000 as against 178,000 while export shipment of calves totalled 73,400 compared with 80,970. Canadian dairies cows, not being affected in the same manner, continued to move to the United States in increased numbers. The export in 1940 totalled a little over 15,000 head compared with 13,000 in 1939. This trade has been making steady expansion. Use Minard's for dandruff.

MAINTAIN SEED SUPPLIES Supplies of seeds of certain field crops and vegetable crops which in normal times came from outside the province are now in short supply. The Agricultural Supply Commission, which is a sub-committee of the Department of Agriculture, is now in the process of directing efforts to encourage home production of these seeds. The result is that there is now no serious concern about essential requirements being met. The Dominion Experimental Farms have practical help in connection with the development of seed production in Canada. A special committee has also been active in connection with the supplies of seeds, some of which are formerly imported from other countries. These supplies have to be made available both in Canada and in the United States.
