#### WHY SALMON IS PINK

Men of science were long puzzled to know why the various salmon and trout have red or pink flesh. Now they believe that the color comes from the food that they eat, observes the Youth's Companion. All of the salmon family are particularly fond of shellfish, and trout eagerly feed on fresh water shrimp. It is well known that when lobsters, prawns and shrimp are cooked the flesh turns pink; similarly the process of digestion turns shellfish pink. When a shrimp is found in the stomach of a salmon or a trout the gastric juices of the fish have turned it almost as red or pink as if it had been boiled. Therefore, even if we had no definite proof, we might believe that the color of the flesh of salmon and trout results from the considerable quantities of various small shellfish that the fishes eat.

#### To Abandon H. M. S. Raleigh

QUEBEC, Aug. 30.—The Chronicle publishes the following:

It has been learned from a reliable source that acting on the advice of expert wreckers and officers of the British Admiralty has decided to abandon H. M. S. Raleigh, stranded on the rocks at Point d'Amour, Strait of Belle Isle. Though the cause of the accident will not be known officially until after a naval court of enquiry has been held, it is learned that it was due to severe weather and that the Raleigh was being steered to clear the icebergs in her vicinity when she went upon the rocks with an impact which fairly tore the greater part of her bottom open. The position of the Raleigh has been viewed from every angle to see if there was any chance of her being salvaged, since the stranding of the cruiser which lies in a very difficult position, has been exposed to bad weather conditions and the straits have been full of ice, so that for two weeks proper investigation has been prevented. It is said that only a short space of time was allowed by the rough weather and ice for the expert investigator to approach the ship and it is now conceded that the ship with her stores and guns will have to be abandoned unless the British Admiralty finally decides otherwise.

#### ENGLISH CRICKET TEAM FOR CANADA NEXT YEAR

That the current visit of the Canadian cricketers to England is doing a good deal to further competition between the Dominion and the Old Country is attested by the receipt of the following cable from Mr. Norman Seagram, who is in charge of the present tour:

Provincial arrangements have been made for an Old Country cricket team to visit Canada next summer. It was not expected when the present tour was undertaken that the Canadians would establish an extraordinary record of victories against the eleven engaged in the home of the game, but the junket of the Canadians and the prospective visit of the Old Countrymen cannot but result in benefit to the ancient game, especially in this country.

—SCHOONER WRECKED.—A telegram received by Joseph Reid and Company on Monday stated that the schooner "Hector McGregor" (Capt. Murray) laden with coal for Reid's had reached Port Hawkesbury in a sinking condition and the cargo which was insured was being disposed of at Port Hawkesbury. Capt. Murray was the owner of the vessel.

—A MEAN TRICK.—One of P. C. Gallant's Lobster fishermen, after getting out in the straits on Tuesday morning to overhaul his lobster gear, before he could reach his line of traps, he noticed his gasoline supply practically all gone, after filling the tank the night before. The refinery will have a capacity for slicing 600 tons of beets every twenty four hours.
