IN THIS CORNER

All is in readiness for the Maritime championship bout at the Forum tonight that sees Jimmy McInnis of Charlottetown, attempt to wrest the bantam title from the brow of Russell 'Kid' Lantz, the present holder. A score of workmen were busy up to late last night getting the battle scene ready for the fray while both camps freely predicted victories as they sent their charges through final tuning-up processes.

16 rounds is the scheduled length of the bout but it is very doubtful if the fight will go that far. Both boys had their punches steaming yesterday and if either finds an opening it will likely be curtains for the receiver. However, McInnis and Lantz leave very few openings in a vulnerable spot and they are trained so fine and in such superb condition that either boy is quite capable of going the gruelling fifteen rounds.

So evenly are the boys matched that yesterday it was hard to find a fan willing to pick a winner. Lantz, the champion, seems to prefer a free swinging, mixing battle and this is in direct contrast to the balling, shifty boxing attack that McInnis usually displays. But both mix it freely at times and who knows but it will be in one of those spots that the end of the fight will come probably with dramatic suddenness.

But whenever the end comes, in between that time, fans will see one of the closest, hardest fights ever staged here. Between two boys that fight clean and hard all the way, the outcome of the scrap has an air of uncertainty about it that is commanding interest daily. The only thing certain about it is that it will be for the title and will be a whole of a battle all the way, with both coming into the ring at 117-12 lbs.

Lantz showed splendid condition last night in a workout at the L. P. U. Hall. He worked at top speed for six rounds of shadow boxing, skipping and punching the heavy bag and at the end hardly drew a deep breath. McInnis worked out in the afternoon and is certainly trained fine. Right at fighting form Jimmy is in the best shape of his career and it will surprise his followers greatly if he doesn't show the best fight of his career tonight.

Accompanying Lantz was his trainer and manager 'Kid' O'Neill and George Carpenter. The latter meets 'Kid' Nickerson in the semi-final on the card and appears like a boy who knows his way about the ring. He appeared every inch a fighter and fans who watched the workout predicted a great semi-final encounter.

Drawing nearly as much attention as Lantz last night was his manager Kid O'Neill. Weighing close to 180 pounds O'Neill was a far different appearing person than the slim-waisted young light-weight of 30 years ago when he was a fighter among fighters, one of the most rugged, gamest battlers in the ring in his day.

Now his fighting days are behind him but still remaining is his love for the game and last night his eyes gleamed brightly as he reminisced slightly over the glory that had been his. In his heyday it mattered little to the 'Kid' when he met. A lightweight or a light-heavy made no difference, and today he has the satisfaction of knowing that during his ring career he was never knocked out of his feet.

He would make no definite statement on the result of the fight. He praised highly the ability and courage of his charge and was looking for him to put up a great battle in defence of his crown.

Junior baseball players got away on the right foot last night when at a well-attended, meeting they made plans for the season and set their starting date as the 24th of May. The meeting was harmonious all the way through. The youngsters meant business. They displayed unbounded enthusiasm, were anxious to get going and soon ended any petty arguments that threatened to arise.

They should have a great season all the way through. Running of the league will be in the hands of capable officers; men who have been identified with sport all their lives both in active competition and executive positions and men who are mightily interested in the juniors. These men will see that the league runs smoothly; the youngsters themselves will do the rest.

Not content with a mere single opening game the Juniors have made arrangements with Summerside Soviets to play here on the afternoon of the 24th against the Canadians while in the evening the opening league game gets underway with Holy Redeemer Dodgers opposing the Esquires at the Park diamond.

Many Trading Deals Loom In Major League

NEW YORK, May 13—With hospitals and sick rooms jammed with players who could form a coup of good all-star clubs and with some of the hot flag contenders nearing a panic, a big trade wind is blowing up over the major league baseball front. Several big deals are expected to be swung before the June 15 deadline for swapping and selling.

Reports still persist New York Giants are hot after Dolph Camilli, the Philadelphia first sacker who's in the Philly doghouse for holding out. St. Louis Cardinals hot after a catcher and another infielder, may swing a deal with Cincinnati Reds, who opened the market yesterday by buying first baseman Baxter Jordan from Boston Bees.

Brooklyn may swap pitcher Tom Baker, infielder Jim Bucher and outfielder Ed Wilson, now with Jersey City, to Philadelphia for pitcher Claude Passeau and catcher Bill Atwood. Even Joe McCarthy of the fading world championship New York Yankees, say reports, is ready to listen to deals as is Mickey Cochrane of the Detroit Tigers.

Tom Henrich is the luckiest baseball rookie of the year. Not only did the Yankees give him \$20,000 for signing a contract and then, after a brief sojourn on the Newark farm, give him a regular's job on their ball club but they wound up by assigning Eddie (Old Scoop) Combs as his roommate and adviser. If he's got the makings, 'Old Scoop' will make a star out of Henrich.

The other luckiest men are Managers-Ple Traynor of Pittsburgh and Burrell Grimes of Brooklyn. Ple insisted the Pirates pay \$20,000 for John (Big Shot) Dickshot. Grimes insisted that Brooklyn sign Gil Brack, who played for Burrell at Louisville. Both Dickshot and Brack are going great.

Carl Hubbell Found For Two Homers, But Hurls Giants To 5-2 Victory Over Pirates

NEW YORK, May 13—(AP)—Carl Hubbell stretched his National League victory string to 21 today by whipping Pittsburgh 5-2 with a six-hit pitching performance. The victory, netted by a fifth inning uprising on the veteran Wally Hoyt, who retired after three runs had crossed the plate, broke the latest Pirate streak that had run to five straight victories. Hubbell collared the Pirates with perfect control of his screwball. In the second inning he doubled off Lefty Brandt, who started on the mound, and in the noisy fifth, he singled to drive home the final run. Off the combined pitching of Brandt, Hoyt, Bauers and Brown, the Giants belted 13 hits whereas Arky Vaughan led the Pittsburgh hitters with homers into the right-field seats in the second and fourth innings. All available big league records show Hubbell's string of 21 straight wins, begun last July 17 has never been accomplished before. The best previously listed was 20 straight compiled by Rube Marquard, another Giant great, with one victory in 1911 and 19 straight in 1912. The Dodgers stretched their winning streak to four straight by whipping Cincinnati Reds 6-4 in Brooklyn. The Dodgers came from behind through the batting pace set by Gil Brack and Buddy Hassett. Rookie Brack had a triple and a single and Hassett had a double and two singles. St. Louis Cardinals defeated the Phillies 5-4 in Philadelphia, scoring the winning run in the seventh on Hugh Mulcahy's wild throw after the Phillies had scored three runs in the sixth to tie the score. Leo Durocher, first man up in the seventh, reached second on Scharen's wild throw. After Orodowski grounded out, Padgett, batting for Lon Warneke, tapped easy one to Mulcahy. The Phils pitcher who held the heavy-hitting Cards to seven hits, threw wild in an attempt to catch Durocher going to third.

As 'King' Carl Wrote New Chapter Into Record Book
