IN MEMORIAM

THE LATE WILLIAM MOFFATT

After an eight weeks illness from heart trouble, Mr. William Moffatt peacefully passed away at his home in Mayfield early on Sunday morning. Mr. Moffatt was born on November 5, 1849, and was a son of James and Jane (Arthur) Moffatt, natives of Scotland. He was educated in the public schools and for many years carried on farming achieving success by his industry and intelligence. Some years ago he also engaged in the coal, lumber and produce trade, owning and running his schooner between the Island and Maritime ports, principally Sydney. He also leaves two sisters, Mrs. Archibald and Miss Janie Moffatt, in New Glasgow, Prince Edward Is-land. In all his business dealings he

was highly respected, not only in his own community, but in other parts of the province where he was well known. He possessed deep religious convictions, and at the time of his death was an elder in the United Church.

In politics he was a strong Liberal and although he never was a candidate, he invariably took an active part in the campaigns and was a forceful and effective platform speaker.

In different activities tending to advance the welfare of the community he took a prominent part, and for a number of years he was a Justice of the Peace.

By his genial personality and optimism he made many warm friends, and the news of his death will be learned with sincere regret. He was a big bodied, big hearted man possessing those qualities of mind and heart which made him an outstanding figure in the district where he had resided for so many years.

There are left to fondly cherish his memory, a widow, nee Miss Caroline Houston, and the following sons and daughters: David, on the homestead; Luther, John and Robert in Sydney; Mrs. Walter Houston and Bruce, in Vandura, Sask.; Mrs. Willard Nicholson, in Mayfield, and James Edward in New Glasgow.

He also leaves two sisters, Mrs. Archibald and Miss Janie Moffatt, in New Glasgow, Prince Edward Is-land.

Accused Of Sinking Vessel

BOSTON, May 18—Captain John Marshall, skipper of the Gloucester fishing schooner Louise B. Marshall, which was destroyed by fire twenty miles off Cape Sable, N. S., May 4, was arrested today to face the now unusual charge of barratry. Captain Marshall is accused of destroying the schooner by fire. At an appearance before United States Commissioner Edwin C. Jenney, Captain Marshall pleaded not guilty and was held in \$1,000 security for hearing June 9. According to members of the schooner's crew, an explosion in the vessel's lighting plant caused the fire. The schooner had been out about a week and had aboard 30,000 pounds of fish. The crew, after attempting to extinguish the fire, reached Cape Sable in their dories. The vessel was valued at \$35,000 and said to be partly insured.

Coast Guards Make Haul

NEW YORK, May 18—Seized as a rum runner in Long Island Sound off New Haven, Conn., at midnight, the 50-foot auxiliary schooner Elizabeth S. was brought into the harbor today. Coast guards overhauled the schooner riding low in the water with an apparently heavy cargo. Inspection after the Captain said he had a cargo of fish resulted in discovery of only three fish, but in a false bottom were found about 400 cases of liquor. The schooner is registered in the name of William H. Grimshaw of New Bedford, Mass.
