Shi-building Advocated

The following letter, endorsing resolution was recently sent to the Minister of Labour by the Labour Protective Union of Charlottetown:
Charlottetown, P. E. Island, February 7, 1917.
Hon. W. T. Crothers, M. P. Minister of Labor. Ottawa.

Dear Sir.—Enclosed please find a resolution passed by our Union endorsing the bonusing of wooden and steel ship building in Canada. If this is acted upon now, work will start immediately in our Province on a number of wooden vessels. The suggestion of the Alberton and West Prince Board of Trade that the Government could issue bonds for five or ten years to the Canadian shipbuilder is a good one, and the money is all spent in Canada, which is much better than granting a cash bonus of a thousand dollars per hundred tons to Norwegian ship-builders in Canadian yards—and thus a cash bonus paid in advance.

The Norwegians are non-resident, non-taxpayers, non-war taxpayers in Canada. The Norwegians pay all their taxes in Norway. Is it not more in the interest of Canada and the Empire to encourage our own people instead of the Norwegians, particularly in war times?

At a meeting of this council held in Charlottetown, P. E. I., the 8th day of February, 1917, we unanimously endorsed the resolution re shipbuilding passed by the Alberton and West Prince Board of Trade of January 17, 1917.

"WHEREAS, the press reports that there are over a hundred empty houses in this city, while a year ago it was impossible to get a house.

"AND WHEREAS, if a Bonus is granted to wooden and steel shipbuilding, there are men in our city and province ready to put money into wooden ships, which will make employment in winter as well as in summer for our labourers, mechanics, and returned soldiers. The building of wooden ships will lead to the building of steel ships in the end.

"AND WHEREAS, the bonusing of wooden shipbuilding will start up mills all over the province, preparing our raw material into finished product, ships and without ships of our own we can not have seamen to man the navy, or for any other purpose.

"THEREFORE RESOLVED, that copies of this resolution be sent to members of Parliament and Senators from P. E. Island at Ottawa; also to Sir Robert L. Borden, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Sir Geo. E. Foster, Hon. Robert Rogers, Hon. W. T. Crothers, and the Press.

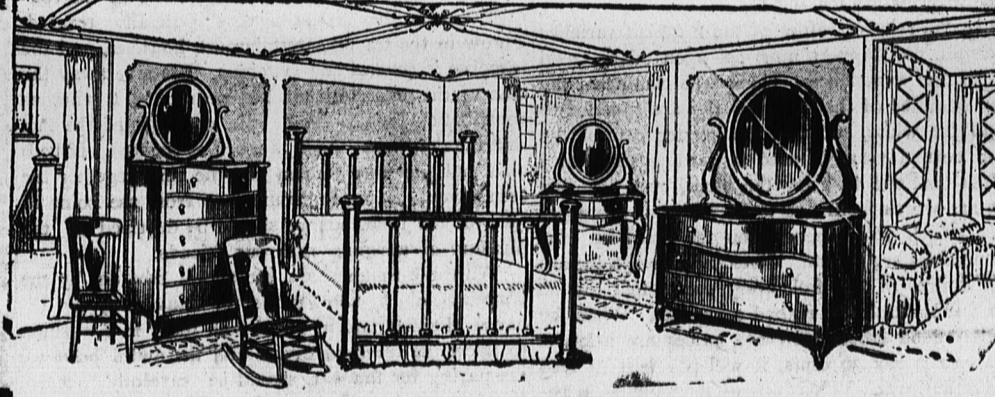
