The Vice Regal Visit

All our citizens will unite in welcoming His Excellency Viscount Willingdon and Lady Willingdon on their visit here this week. It will be regretted, however, that the visit is in the nature of a farewell tour.

There have been thirteen Governors-General of this Dominion, most of them very able men, some of them highly distinguished men.

There are few Canadians, as a matter of fact, who know their own country as well as it is known by Viscount and Lady Willingdon.

Lord and Lady Willingdon have been great travellers, and thus have founded a tradition which, it is hoped, will be followed by their successors.

Another "I'm Alone."

According to the Hon. Thane A. Campbell, recently appointed Attorney General who is seeking election in the Second District of Prince, the present Government has "very effectively enforced the Prohibition Act and fulfilled their promises to the people."

Efficient enforcement, according to the Liberal organ's definition in the election of 1927, meant "the boon of a banished liquor traffic."

Mr. Campbell must have in mind a new definition. In the announcement which he thought it necessary to make of an agreement between the candidates that liquor would not be used for vote-buying purposes, he practically admits the existence of available sources of liquor supply within the very constituency in which he is running.

If this is what Mr. Campbell considers to be "effective enforcement," we suggest that he re-read the following editorial from the Patriot of June 27, 1927, published immediately after the "great prohibition victory" of the Liberal party in that year:

Unemployment Claims

In our opinion the two representatives who have gone to Ottawa should not be satisfied with less than \$1,000,000, and if they obtain that amount it will go a long way towards improving our highways and preferably making a permanent road from Georgetown and Tignish to Borden.

Although diligent efforts are being made to discover possible evidence of higher prices under the recently enacted higher duties, all indications point to producers keeping faith with the Government.

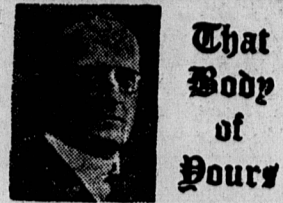
It has taken, says The London Truth, the Trades Unions a very long time to discover that they cannot protect their hours and wages without protecting the products of those hours and wages.

RAISING YOUR TEMPERATURES

As you know when a patient has a high temperature the first thing that is sought of is some medicine or drug to reduce the temperature.

And yet physicians are now beginning to think of a high temperature as just a sign that something is wrong inside the body.

Something is wrong and that something is what is causing the body to raise its temperature in order to fight off the thing that is wrong.

Later it was felt that it was not the malaria itself that had caused the cure, but the high temperature that the body was subjected to by the "chills and fever" of malaria.

With these short radio waves it is possible to cause a fever in man rapidly without great discomfort, and to a degree high enough to have the same value as that caused by malaria or other infection.

Anyone desiring to view the Annapolis Valley by the easiest and most direct route should take the D. A. R. train at Halifax, and he will be carried through a wealth of delightful scenery that is probably unequalled in any other part of the Maritimes.

Bedford, for instance, is named after the Great Duke of Bedford, who was Secretary of State for the Colonies when Halifax was founded in 1749.

Windsor, of course, is reminiscent of the family name of the King and Queen of England, they having adopted it from the castle of that name, which has cradled the Royal Family since the time of the Stuarts.

Weymouth is another station that owes the origin of its name to a Secretary of State for the Colonies in the British Government.

Grand Pre is probably next to Annapolis Royal the best known name on this route, associated as it is with Longfellow's Poem, Evangeline.

At this time of year, Wolfville is naturally a place of particular beauty, the leaves turning into various colors and shades and making a wonderful picture against the setting sun.
