Tragic Story from North Relating to Murder of Corporal Doak, R.C.M.P.

OTTAWA, Aug. 13.—A tragic story such as we generally supposed to belong to the more adventurous days of the past of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, is just recovered in the official statement handed out by Lieut. Colonel Courtland Stames, acting commissioner of the R. C. M. P., regarding the murder of Corporal W. A. Doak and Otto Binder, manager of the Hudson Bay depot at Tree River in the far north last April and the details of which have only just reached headquarters, though the report of the murder was published in a despatch from Edmonton about three or four weeks ago.

Gets Three Murderers

"A number of Eskimo villages were visited and Kent Peninsula was finally reached. Here Corporal Doak found that since the killing of the three men and two women in the summer of 1921, a further murder had been committed. Native Tatamigana, who had taken part in the above killing, assisted Alkomiak in the murder of his uncle, Pugnana. Tatamigana was located at the village and placed under arrest. Alkomiak had gone inland and Corporal Doak started in pursuit. After a few days' travelling, Alkomiak was overtaken and also placed under arrest by Corporal Doak. The land to which the Eskimos belong is the same that a few years ago were implicated in the murder of the two prospectors, Messrs. Radford and Street.

GERMANY REPARATIONS IS NOW DIFFICULT

BERLIN, Aug. 13.—Gold payments are not Germany's only worries in meeting the demands of the Entente. Official reports indicate that she has had to disgorge liberally from her livestock assets. These deliveries are in compensation for requisitions made by the Germans during the war.

NURSE AND BROTHER RESURRECTED BODY

SAULT STE. MARIE, Mich., August 13.—Mrs. Ruth Knudson a nurse formerly employed by a physician here, and her brother, Clifford Harrison, have confessed, Thomas H. Green, assistant prosecuting attorney, announced today, that they removed the body of Mrs. C. E. Fairchild in October, 1919, from the Drummond Island cemetery.

According to the statement issued by the assistant prosecutor, the alleged removal was made to permit Knudson to sell certain fat organs of the body to an unnamed physician, Mrs. Fairchild, having died of a peculiar disease. Officers are attempting to locate the physician.

Green declared the alleged confession detailed a plan to take the body to Canada, place it in a house and burn the structure. Instead, according to the purported confessions, the body was reburied in a shallow grave along the shore of Drummond Island, where it was uncovered a few weeks later by dogs.
