FINANCE

NEW YORK, Feb. 28—(AP)—Reports of advancing aircraft production and predictions of better days for steel manufacturing spurred their representative stocks in a rise today which carried the entire market upward. True, the forward movement was a fractional affair and it was hesitant, but the day's final records showed an advance had been made. Bell Telephone, in the Canadian group, fell back one point to 138 while Dome and Ford lost fractions. Slight improvements were shown in International Nickel, Brazilian Trucon, Imperial Oil and Lake Shore. The Associated Press average of 60 selected stocks rose .1 of a point to 49.7. Transactions totaled 577,710 shares compared with 510,330 yesterday. It was the fourth consecutive advance in the amount of daily trade. Leaders in the upswing were Douglas, United Aircraft, Martin, Pan American Airways, U. S. Steel, Chrysler, Allied Chemical, Eastman, DuPont, International Nickel, Phelps Dodge, American Telephone, Standard Oil of N. J., and Santa Fe. New highs for the year were set by Left Interborough Rapid Transit and Brooklyn and Queens Transit preferred.

The stock market closed with mixed trend today after displaying firmness for the greater part of the session. Foundation and Asbestos weakened in constructions but Dominion Bridge gained a fraction. C. P. R. eased 1-8 in the rails while National Steel Car and Canadian Locomotive appeared with small gains. Metals retreated with Nickel, Hudson Bay and Noranda chalking up fractional declines but papers gained ground as St. Lawrence Corporation preferred Bathurst and Dryden edged slightly higher. In the balance of the list minor improvements were shown for steamship issues, Distillers-Sea-grams, Dominion Tar and Brazillion while off narrowly were Massey Harris, Gurd, Montreal Power, Shawinigan and National Breweries. Total sales: 183,700; Industrials, 22,500; Mines 161,200; Bonds \$5,000.

Livestock

MONTREAL, Feb. 28—(CP)—Prices on all classes of livestock were steady today on the Montreal livestock markets, the Dominion Department of Agriculture reported today.

Receipts were 42 cattle, three sheep and lambs, 584 hogs, and 206 calves. Cattle were common to good quality cows. Good cows were mostly \$5.50 with medium kinds \$4.50 to \$5.25 a common butchers down to \$4. Canners and cutters \$3 to \$3.75. Veal calves ranged from \$8 for common light veals to \$10.50 for medium good kinds. Fair to medium veals brought \$9.50 to \$10. Drinkers were \$5 to \$7. A few lambs made \$9.00 to \$9.50, and sheep \$6. Hogs were mostly \$9.35 for bacon fed and watered and \$9.40 to \$9.50 off trucks. Selects drew \$1 a hog premium with the regular cuts on off grades. Sows were \$6 to \$6.50. Hogs sold on rail grade were mostly \$12.40 net weight.

On Maritime livestock markets all livestock prices were unchanged. Choice steers were \$7.60, good \$6.75, medium \$6, fair \$5.35, common \$4 to \$4.25. Choice heifers were \$6.60, good \$6, medium \$5.50, fair \$5, and common \$3.50 to \$4. Good cows were \$5.50, medium \$4.75, fair \$3.75. Canners and cutters \$3 to \$4. Boning bulls were \$3 to \$3.25 and butcher bulls \$3.50 to \$4.50. Veal calves were \$4 to \$9.50 and grassers \$4 to \$4.50. Lambs were \$9 to \$9.50. Hogs sold at \$12.00 rail grade hot weight. Sows at \$7.70 hot weight.

LORD TWEEDSMUIR'S DYING MESSAGE ON BOY SCOUTS

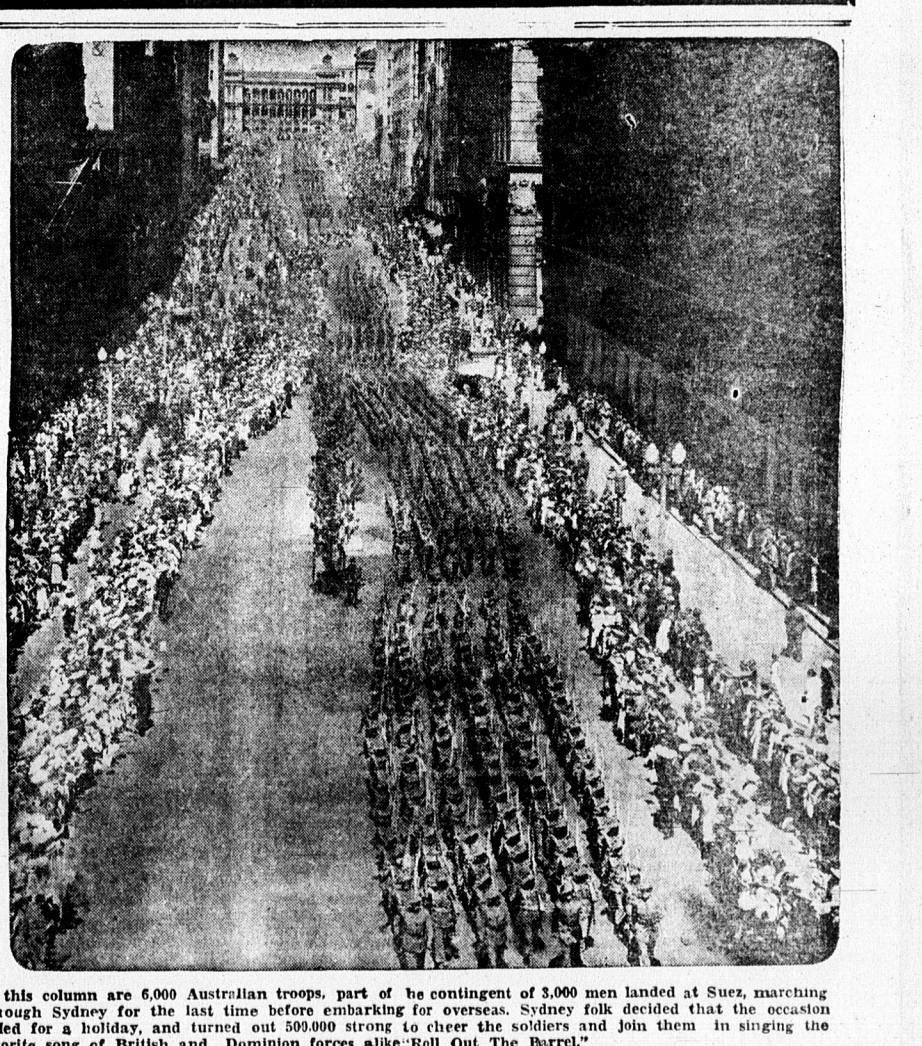
An address the late Governor-General prepared for delivery at the annual banquet of the Boy Scouts' Association of Canada was read at the banquet in Toronto on Saturday.

Lord Tweedsmuir suggested linking Scout training more closely with the practical problems which are facing the growing youth of the Dominion.

"We are giving our Scouts an admirable moral and physical discipline which is the true basis for a worthy and successful life," Lord Tweedsmuir wrote. "You cannot put the value of that too high.

"The problems of youth are more difficult today than ever before and they are not going to be easier when this war is over. Cannot we, while these boys are in our charge, do more by advice and training to see that when they enter a grown-up world, they have a reasonable chance. Cannot we, while keeping in the forefront our moral and spiritual ideals, take pains to see that our Scouts, when they enter adult life, shall have a real chance to reap the fruit of their training, and shall not get into the wrong grooves, or into blind alleys which lead to a dead wall."
