BERLIN CONTINUES LIBEL ON CANADA

LONDON, Nov. 12. (Special)—According to the Lokalanseiger of Berlin, has published a second article on Canada, in which the correspondent says that the farms seen from the railroads are owned by fortunate who arrived a few decades ago, millionaire peasants with diamonds and red, chapped fingers which had never learned to write. Prosperous homesteads are often described to travellers who see nothing of the country.

Referring to homestead conditions, the correspondent pictures immigrants arriving with large families, their furniture dumped in the midst of the wild prairie. With no trees the obligation of building a house, he says, entails an expenditure of \$875 to \$1,000, besides which they

must acquire draught horses and implements. Farmhouses in the hinterland, it is declared, are made from a tree trunk, hovels that would shame Diogenes and make him seem a sybarite in comparison. The farmers on the prairie suffer endless winters which drive men to drink and women to the mad-house. He asserts that there is a diminution in the number of applicants for homesteads, despite differing newspaper reports, and claims that his assertion is founded on fact.

The article concludes with the statement that Canadian farm life affords no recreation for Europeans who are weary of towns, and that it is for many dangerous to return to nature.

MASSACRE OF JEWS IN RUSSIA FEARED

ST. PETERSBURG, Nov. 12. (Special)—"The entire Jewish people in Russia is in constant fear of massacre as an outcome of this case," says the annual report of the Executive Committee of the American Jewish Committee, referring to the trial of Mendel Beiliss at Kief. The case is referred to as "the most tragic occurrence in Jewish life for many years."

The report was submitted yesterday at the seventh annual meeting in this city of the American Jewish Committee, a national organization whose announced purpose is to "prevent infringement on the rights of Jews in this country and abroad and to relieve them in case of distress and persecution."

SPEECH IS FREE SAYS GOMPERS.

SEATTLE, Wash., Nov. 10.—"I promise you that this convention shall be an open forum," said President Samuel Gompers, addressing the American Federation of Labor's opening session today, and if we have a word to say of Judge Wright or Judge Humphries or Judge Jeffries, we are going to say it.

"We believe it is not in the power of a judge to interfere with the exercise of free assemblage, free speech, and free press. These rights were won from unwilling monarchs on the other side of the of life, and do you suppose we shall surrender them?"

When a judge clothed in a little brief authority assumes powers decreed to the president and congress, it is a duty to protest."

Secretary of Labor Wilson sat at Mr. Gompers' side. The report of the credentials committee seated all persons presenting credentials except those from unions which were delinquent in dues to the federation, and a few delegates whose seats were contested.

A summary of the report of the Executive Council was read by First Vice-President Dunken.

HELD-UP MAN FOUND TO BE AN ACCESSORY.

WELLAND, Nov. 10.—Ernest Clark and J. Duffy of Ridgeway appeared before Judge Livingstone yesterday. Clark was charged with holding up and robbing Duffy, who was night operator on the Grand Trunk at Ridgeway, of \$38, Grand Trunk money, and Duffy with being an accessory. Both were found guilty. Duffy was sentenced to three months; Clark, who was arrested near St. Thomas, and attempted suicide by hanging while in jail there, and also attempted to hang himself since being brought here, was remanded to give an opportunity to the doctors to examine him as to his sanity.
