Hints for the Motorist
BY ALBERT L. CLOUGH

REAR AXLE ADJUSTMENTS
G. T. L. writes: My car does
not run evenly, especially when
it is pulling hard. Can this be due
to the pinion and ring-gear not
meshing right? The rear wheels
are loose and make a noise. I put
in new thrust washers, but this did
not remove the play. Is there a
tube inside the axle-casing and can
this have become worn?
Answer: We imagine that the un-
even running is due to explosions
missed by the engine and not to
faulty mesh of the gears. If the
mesh is not correct the gears will
be very noisy. The only way to
adjust the mesh is to loosen the
lock of the propeller-shaft thrust
bearing and screw the bearing in
or out until the most quiet oper-
ation is attained, finally locking
the adjustment. This is done with
rear wheels jacked up and the
wheels being turned by the engine.
The thrust washers are the only
means of taking up axle-shaft end-
play. Perhaps you need special
ones. There is no adjustment for
the wheel bearings, new ones being
required when they are badly worn.
The bearing run on a tube within
the main axle-casing and this may
be worn.

GEAR STICKS IN ENGAGEMENT
A. R. L. writes: When my car
comes to a standstill on direct
drive, I often find that I cannot
throw it out of gear, unless I let
in the clutch slightly, and just as
it takes hold, throw the gear. I
have no trouble in throwing the
gear out when the car is moving.
There is plenty of oil in the trans-
mission. As this car has run only
2,500 miles is it possible that the
parts are still stiff and cause the trouble?
Answer: New transmissions often
bother in this manner, but loosen
up after a few thousand miles. If
you make a practice of throwing
out the gears before the car stops,
which is considered good practice,
you will avoid the difficulty. Your
make of car is peculiar in that
neutralizing the gear from direct-
drive position involves the remesh-
ing of the countershaft gears as
well as withdrawing the high-speed
clutch. With most cars, it is only
the latter action that is required.
This may be the reason why your
trouble is confined to throwing out
the high-gear and does not apply
to the other speeds. When the
parts are fully smoothed up, we
believe you will have no further
trouble.

with the British India company at
present.
