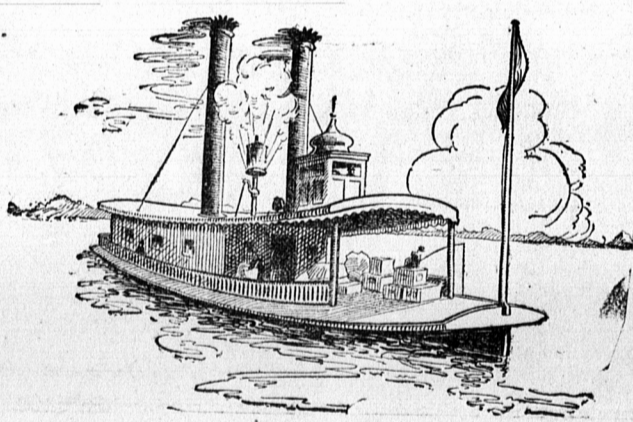

FAILED TO REACH MEN FROM KARLUK

NOME, Alaska, July 19.—The ice breaking steamer Kit arrived here yesterday from a cruiser in the Arctic. The captain reported that he tried for fourteen days to break through the ice field to reach Wrangell Island and take off the men of the Stefansson exploring expedition who have been marooned there since the old whaler Karluk was crushed in the ice last winter. The Kit was unable to approach nearer than 120 miles of Wrangell Island and finally abandoned the attempt.

All information received here is that the ice in the Arctic this year is worse than ever known before and for this reason the revenue cutter Bear, which is to take Captain Robert Bartlett, master of the Karluk, to Wrangell Island to take off the refugees, has delayed sailing until more favorable conditions prevail.

CONFEDERATION PROCESSION.—In the Provincial Building last night there was held a meeting of representatives of the various societies which will take part in the grand parade at the Confederation Celebration. The purpose of the meeting was to decide the order of procession. As there was not an adequate attendance, however, owing no doubt to the unpleasant state of the weather, nothing definite was arranged. After this meeting there was held a meeting of the Celebration Committee at which the following route of procession was finally decided upon. Starting from the Provincial Building, the procession will march along Richmond Street to Queen Street; thence to Water Street; through Water to Prince, then into Kent. It will then proceed along Kent Street to Victoria Park, returning by Brighton Road, into Queen, stopping at the corner of Richmond and Queen Streets.

SIR LOUIS DAVIS DEPUTY GOV.-GENERAL

OTTAWA, July 20.—Sir Louis Davis, who was administrator of the Government during the absence of His Royal Highness the Duke of Connaught in Newfoundland, has been appointed Deputy Governor-General and will act in that capacity while the Duke is in the west. Mr. Rodolphe Boudreau, Clerk of the Privy Council, has gone to Charlottetown to administer the oath of office to Sir Louis.

fore they might as well go peaceably.

THE HINDUS LOOK LIKE WAR.

The Hindus are not preparing for peace, however, they are preparing for war. The forward and aft well decks on the vessel sport wooden barricades, backed up with coal, and it looks as if they are prepared to make a vigorous defense. With a message from the Governor-General, H. H. Stevens, M. P., and Immigration Inspector Hopkinson, with a party went out to the ship at one o'clock yesterday afternoon. The wire was from the Duke of Connaught to the Hindu passengers on board the steamer. No one appears to know just what was contained in the message to the passengers on the Maru, in reply to their message of - day or two ago, but it is quite apparent that it was nothing definitely satisfactory to the passengers. The probability suggested is that the Governor-General simply said that the question was being taken up with the department concerned. At all events it would seem it was the reply that was expected.

THE RAINBOW PROVISIONED FOR SEA.

Following the receipt of orders from the Naval Department at Ottawa to have the Rainbow provisioned and made ready to proceed to Vancouver at a moment's notice, the sailing wharf at Esquimaux was yesterday morning the scene of much animation. Bluejackets and yard hands were working hard, putting stores aboard and getting the ship ready. Several divers donned their suits and went below to look over the bottom of the cruiser. She has been riding at her buoy for some months and her hull is in very bad condition and a slight leak was discovered. The submarine workers removed some of the sea growth and repaired the hull in good shape.
