TITANIC INVESTIGATION

(Continued from page 7)
this week.
Lord Mersey has given a pretty clear indication in the course of the proceedings of the evidence heard, and it is likely that his views, on the main lines at any rate, will be much changed by the speeches of the various counsel, who are still to be heard. For instance, during the hearing today, he made this significant comment:
"I am disposed to take the view on the whole that this disaster was due to excessive speed."
It is taken as certain that no sentence will be passed on Captain Smith, while J. Bruce Ismay will escape criticism as not having exercised any influence upon the navigation of the ship. Lord Mersey, from the remarks that he interpolated during Finlay's speech, appears to have reached the conclusion that Ismay was only a passenger, and that Captain Smith's action in showing him the wireless warning of ice was hardly more than a courtesy due to the director of the line.
Personalities broadly speaking, will be eliminated, for, as Lord Mersey has said, they can lead to nothing. On the other hand, it is expected that the head of the court will find that the Californian did see the distress signals, which were those of the Titanic, and that the Californian's officers failed in their duty in that regard. It must be remembered that the constitution of the court gives it

no jurisdiction over the certificates of these officers.
Definite recommendations are expected from the court. One will be for a change of route at times when ice is prevalent. A second will urge the slackening of speed in the ice region.
In respect to the management of wireless it is, on the whole, unlikely that Lord Mersey will recommend the change which many persons desire, that of making the operators responsible solely to the captain, but he is expected to report in favor of an increase in the wireless staff, both in the number of operators and in persons to fetch and carry for them, which will insure a continuous wireless service on board.

All the Islanders are safe, this was the cheering message received yesterday by A. A. McDonald & Bros., Georgetown, from Fred Foley, formerly of Charlottetown and latterly of Regina. In this message Prince Edward Islanders will, without exception, find cause for gratitude and thankfulness.

The services in connection with the reopening of the Victoria Methodist Church on Sunday last were largely attended. Collections for the day amounted to one hundred and seventy-five dollars, the preachers for the occasion being Rev. James Strothard of Summerside at 11 and 7 and Rev. Hammond Johnson of Bedeque at 3 o'clock. This church has been very much improved both inside and out and now ranks among the finest places of worship in the Province.

The death occurred at Junction Road, Strathalbyn, on June 25, 1912, of Mrs. John Munroe in the 44th year of her age. The deceased was highly respected. Her funeral took place on Wednesday the 26th of June. She leaves a disconsolate husband and three daughters to mourn their loss but their loss is her gain for she died as she lived a true Christian. The funeral service was conducted by her pastor Rev. John Gillis. A great deal of sympathy is felt for the bereaved children whose father was absent in the west when the wife and mother died.

THE BOSTON ACCIDENT

BOSTON, July 2—Flying high over head yesterday afternoon when Miss Harriet Quimby and W. P. Willard were dashed to death, was Miss Blanche Stuart Scott another aviator. From her high altitude, Miss Scott had watched Miss Quimby's splendid flight and was nearby when the gust upset the monoplane. In the excitement of the moment no one noticed the lone aviator, but when Miss Quimby's body was brought ashore all eyes were directed aloft and Miss Scott was seen making sweeping circles over the field at a height of 500 feet. Twice she started to descend but each time she was seen to falter. In another moment, summoning all her nerve, she turned the nose of her machine downward, and landed safely, collapsing in her seat before anyone could reach her.

Before going up on their last flight, Miss Quimby talked confidentially about her plans to make an altitude record, that would stand as a woman's high mark. In crossing the English Channel on April 16, Miss Quimby flew at an altitude of 6,000 feet which was believed to be record for women. Miss Quimby yesterday said she felt sure that she could beat this mark, although she did not believe she could excel the record of 13,943 feet set by Garris.

Miss Quimby and Willard were returning from a trip over the harbor to Boston Light and back, a distance of 20 miles. The flight was made in 20 minutes. Heading back into the eighty mile gusty wind, Miss Quimby started a volplane. One of the gusts caught the tail of the monoplane throwing the machine straight up in the air. For an instant it poised there. Then Willard's body was thrown clear of the chassis, followed almost immediately by Miss Quimby's. Hurting over and over the two bodies shot downward, striking the water twenty feet from shore. The monoplane plunged down fifteen feet away. The water was only five feet deep.

Men from the Savin Hill Yacht Club nearby, were on the spot quickly and leaping overboard, from their motorboats, hauled the two bodies out of the mud into which they had sunk deeply. Death was probably instantaneous. Both bodies were badly crushed. Several of Miss Quimby's bones were broken, and there were many large bruises, Willard who weighed 190 pounds, hit the water face first, and over one eye there was a gash from which the blood was flowing. He too, had several fractures, and bruises. When the two victims were laid out on the ground at Squantum Head on the edge of the aviation field, the crowd rushed over, but a troop of State Cavalry held the people back.
