Canada Refuses To Barter With Soviet Russia

Minister Of National Revenue Makes Announcement That Dominion Will Have No Truck Or Trade With The Soviet.

(Special to the Guardian)

OTTAWA, Ont., Feb. 28.—Canada refused to barter with Soviet Russia. Official announcement was made by Hon. E. B. Ryckman, Minister of National Revenue this afternoon, that virtually all importations from Russia are prohibited effective at once. The Government does not mince words in telling the world Canada will have no truck nor trade with the Soviet. The statement is an emphatic rebuke to the Soviet agent who dangled a \$10,000,000 order before Canadian industrial concerns and an indictment of the Soviet system of producing timber and coal by conscript labor. HALIFAX, March 1.—The annual game of fixing the dates for Daylight Saving time is on in the Maritime Provinces. Some weeks ago the Halifax City Council decided on May 10 and September 27 as the opening and closing dates. Later the Saint John City Council picked the period May 16 to September 12. Still later the Saint John Council formally decided to conform to the Halifax Council, unaware that Saint John was conforming, officially lengthened the period of daylight saving time from April 29 to September 27.

PRES. OF PERU FORCED TO RESIGN

Armed Revolt Threatens For More Than Week—Navy Asks Resignation.

LIMA, Peru, March 1.—Lieut. Col. N. Sanchez Gerro resigned as provisional President of Peru today, after his regime had been threatened by armed revolt for more than a week. The President's resignation followed by a few hours action of the Peruvian Navy, which called upon him to quit to prevent civil war, and at the same time held up the movement of ships which were bearing loyal forces to the south to put down rebellion in the vicinity of Arequipa. At the same time the sea forces demanded that the Government be turned over provisionally to a new Junta, composed of the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court as President, navy representatives, army representatives and civilians.

12 MEMBERS OF MILITARY BAND PERISH

Had Been Playing At Supper For Prince of Wales Previous To Catastrophe.

SANTIAGO, Chile, March 1.—Twelve members of a military band, which had been playing at a supper for the Prince of Wales, were drowned when the lighter in which they were returning to Valdivia was rammed and sunk on Lake Llanquihue late last night. Seven members of the band were rescued. The lighter foundered after it was struck by the steamer Chile. Only one body was recovered.

SENDS MESSAGE TO DOMINION

PARIS, Feb. 28.—Arsene Henry, successor to Georges Jean Knight as French Minister to Canada, will sail for the Dominion aboard the "Paris" on Wednesday. Today Mr. Henry was received by Aristide Briand, who asked him to convey to the Canadian people France's most profound sentiment of friendship and affection which, he said, is based on centuries of historical relations.

Some Of Corrupt Work of Sask. Liberals Is Exposed

REGINA, Sask., March 1.—That political influence had been exerted by the old administration upon provincial police in civil and criminal cases was the finding of the Royal Commission which investigated charges against the former Saskatchewan Liberal government. The report was tabled in the Legislature this afternoon.

In the Legislature last year Hon. J. F. Bryant, Minister of Public Works, charged the former regime had used certain members of the provincial police force and civil service as a political influence.

Says U.S. Loses in War Debt Payments from Great Britain

C.L. Burton Tells the University of Toronto Commerce Club That It is the Most Expensive Money That the U. S. Can Receive, and Gives Reasons.

TORONTO, March 1.—For every dollar that the United States receives from Great Britain in war debt payments she loses from three to five dollars in the United States, according to C. L. Burton told the University of Toronto Commerce Club in Hart House last night. Showing how the United States, receiving \$500,000 a day from Britain, had loaned most of the money in the form of merchandise, to Germany and her creditors, and so had provided a market for herself, that was responsible for the 1920-29 unnatural inflation in American industry that had resulted in the stock market disasters of two years ago, Mr. Burton said: "I ask the United States, for her own sake, to cancel the war debts, and not to take any more money from Great Britain. It is the most expensive money that she can receive."

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17 PEASANTS ARE EATEN BY WOLVES

GET AWAY WITH \$17,000

\$18,000 Fire

ANTIGONISH, N. S., Mar. 1.—Fire of unknown origin caused damage roughly estimated at \$15,000 to the four-storey, wooden Somers Building in the business section of this town early today. The structure was renovated in 1927, when a two-story addition was built, the second floor converted into offices and the first divided into store sections. The main part of the building was practically a total loss, as well as the second storey of the new addition. Some of the office contents were saved.

Says Canadian Embargo Proper

"Very Proper," Says U. S. Congressman, With Regard Dominion Govt. Action In Placing Embargo On Russian Imports.

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 1.—"Very proper," said Hamilton Fish, Jr., the Congressman, whose committee has been investigating Communist activities in the United States, when he was informed of the action of the Canadian Government in placing an embargo on Russian imports. "It looks to me," he said, "as though this were the only sort of action which will offer protection to free labor from the world over against the competition of forced or conscripted labor. Our only method of protecting the standard of living of free labor is to shut off the forced labor by embargo. We can't do that on a tariff basis."

Congressman Fish said he expected that when in January, 1932, the new treasury regulation, placing upon the exporter the burden of proof as to whether his product was the result of "forced or indentured labor" went into effect the United States would bar all Russian products.

Medical Rum Ring Alleged In States

NEW YORK, March 1.—What was described as the largest liquor prescription syndicate ever uncovered in the United States, was believed to have been broken up today when agents of Horace J. Simmons, Special Treasury Department Agent of this district, aided by 100 picked men of the staff of Andrew McCampbell, Prohibition Administrator, arrested more than 30 persons in 14 simultaneously conducted raids in Manhattan, the Bronx and Brooklyn. The syndicate, which is said to have done a \$3,000,000 a year business for past six or eight years, diverting medicinal liquor by the illegal use of prescriptions, had been aided in its operations, according to Mr. Simmons, by about 1,000 physicians and at least 400 druggists.
