**ISLAND BOYS GET PERMANENT BASE POSITIONS**

The following letter has been received by Miss Matilda Campbell, Poplar Point, from Pt. Earle Jenkins, of Dundas, now stationed at Whitley Camp, Surrey, England:  
105th Battalion, D. Co.,  
Witley Camp, Surrey,  
England.

Dear friend.—Your very welcome letter of Dec. 8th received today, and I was glad to hear from you, and to know that you were all enjoying good health, as it leaves me and all our friends and acquaintances in the 105th Battalion. As you doubtless know already, we arrived at Shorncliffe, Kent, the last of July and were billeted in tents there for three months, as it was a very pretty place, as it was near the sea-coast. When it got too wet the latter part of October the Battalion moved up here to their winter quarters (about 120 miles from Shorncliffe.)

This is a very nice place, quite a large camp, with about 20,000 men billeted here. The wooden huts we are in hold about thirty-five men each, and have electric lights in them. We have good sleeping accommodations (no bed-room suites of course), but we have six blankets each, also a tick and pillow filled with straw.

I was only a day in the tents at Shorncliffe as there were ten of us 105th fellows picked out for Brigada Police. It was a very good job. We were billeted in huts there. I was on the job for over five months. Came up here on the 29th Dec. I had about nine days drill, the first I had since we left Valcartier, the 13th July; and I thought they were going to make a soldier of me here, but I was put on the police force again Saturday last. Joe McLellan, Cardigan, has been on this job ever since they came to Witley, about two months ago. It is a very good job, but I would prefer to drill now, and get ready for the front. Three of the "home boys" have gone to France already out of the 105th.—John McDonald, next to John Acorn's; Jack Matheson, Mt. Hope, and Milford Cantello, Strathcona. That is all from near Dundas and vicinity. Some have gone from Launching, Felix Walker has gone for one. I was still at Shorncliffe when the drafts left here, about 350 men in all, and I hardly know who all went yet.

Sam Acorn, Ed. Matheson, Joe Campbell, Angus McMaster, and Jack Livingstone and all our P. B. jobs (permanent base) as they are under age. Alfred Gardiner is a lance corporal in the Medical Corps; Charley Riley, Strathcona, is in the signalling section, and the remainder of the boys here drilling that enlisted the time I did are Sam Nicholson, Ewen McDonald, Moodie and Ruchen Acorn, Willie Miller, Dan McBeth and Cousin Jack; also the three Amundale boys, Marple Howlett, Lezman Blackett and Harry Tassel, all of them are O.K. I am billeted about half a mile from where they are, and can get up every day to see them. I hear from Floyd quite often, he was fine when he wrote last.

I think we will all be home for Xmas this year. I spent a very good one over here considering there was such a war on.

Well, Matilda, I will have to ring off. Kind regards to all the folk. Answer soon. Your sincere friend,

**THE PRICE OF RUBBER FOOTWEAR GOES UP**

Since the first of the new year the rubber manufacturers have advanced the price on all rubber footwear in the United States and Canada from 15 to 20 per cent.

The cause of the advance is the high cost of cotton and other materials that go into the manufacture of rubber footwear, also the scarcity and high cost of labor which has made it very difficult to get out their orders on time. Orders that were placed last March have not all been delivered yet.

The skilled labor problem is getting serious in the large manufacturing centres and unless some relief comes in this respect another advance may be expected. 4022-1-24Mws41.
