An' remember there's a day fr' every night.

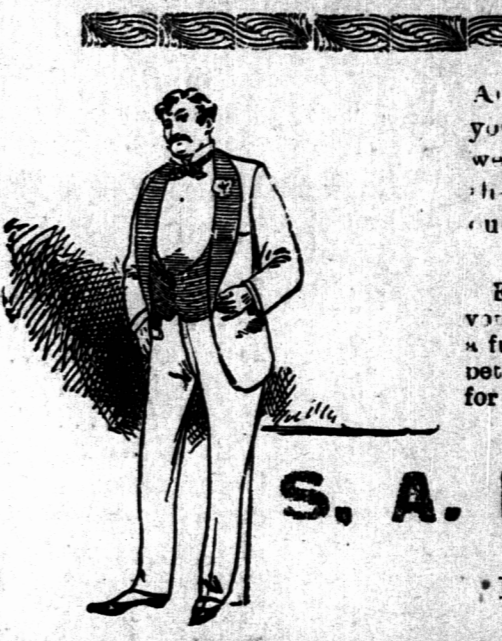
