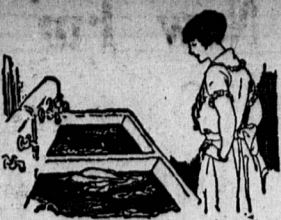

SOUTHAMPTON, Eng., Oct. 11—Isaac Guggenheimer, United States capitalist and copper magnate died here suddenly today.

U. S. WILL LIKELY RECEIVE INVITATION

PARIS, Oct. 10.—It was stated last night on official authority that in all probability the United States will receive a formal invitation to participate in the proposed Near East peace conference at Scutari, opposite Constantinople. The informant declared it was the wish of the Allies that the United States be represented by a delegation with full powers but said as to the likelihood of American acceptance they were quite doubtful. The United States it was explained had received many invitations to sit at council tables with the Allies. In every case since the original peace conference in Paris however it had declared with the exception of having an ambassador act as unofficial observers which to all practical purposes was not really representation.

The case of the Near East conference is cited as exceptional of account of American interests that will be involved both in what concerns the American policy toward the Straits in commercial and political problems which are to be regulated between the western nations and Asia Minor. In addition grave questions of great importance regarding the Christian minorities in Asia Minor the United States interests are linked up with numerous missionary projects and schools and commercial concessions which were in operation.

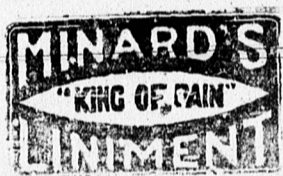
United Farmers Will Render Assistance

WINNIPEG, Oct. 11.—Action independent of the provincial government to secure assistance for farmers who find themselves in difficult conditions has been taken by the United Farmers of Manitoba, and representatives of the mortgage companies, Stanley Long of the Royal Trust Company, announced yesterday, at conference between the U. F. M. and the mortgage company representatives Friday it was decided to form a small committee to adjust differences.

Irish Gov't Soon in Market For Loan

DUBLIN, Oct. 11.—The Irish government soon will be in the market for a loan to carry it through the remaining six months of its first and probably worst year. The Irish banks do not anticipate any difficulty in getting the money without going outside the island, especially as it is understood that Great Britain will guarantee the notes until the Free State is on its feet. The new budget of £37,000,000 (roughly \$162,800,000) admittedly exceeds the estimated revenue by \$44,000,000 and official statistics for 1920 show that the revenue of the twenty six counties was \$132,000,000 and exceeded the expenditures by \$5,200,000, but the situation is not as alarming as this might indicate.
